A PATRIOTIC CONGRESS.

There will be no war with Cuba. The action of congress in appropriating \$50,000,000 as an emergency fund in case of war is a notice to Spain what she may expect in case the United States is provoked to hostilities. The scene in the house of representatives Tuesday, when this monster appropriation was ordered, is probably without a parallel in the history of congress. Every member present voted for the resolution; not a voice was raised against it. Members who had been paired with absentees took the responsibility of breaking their pairs in order to go on record as voting for the appropriation. The vote stood 311 ayes; noes—none.

The proceedings in the house during the brief discussion were in every way creditable to the American people and their representatives in congress. The brief speeches made were replete with expressions of patriotism, and at the same time free from inflammatory design. Party lines melted away and Populists vied with Democrats in rushing to the support of the president when the national honor was assailed. The opportunity was eagerly seized by representatives from the South to pledge their allegiance to the old flag and to re-assert that the issues of the great civil war were forgotten and forgiven.

This occasion marked a grand reunion between the North and South. The opportunity had never before come in such a way that the Southern members as one man could show that the stars and stripes are as dear to them as they are to the men of the North.

The country has reason to congratulate itself over what has just occurred, and the pessimists who have been preaching the decadence of American patriotism have received a serious set back. Spain will pay strict heed to what has occurred in congress, and now that the temper of the American people has been made apparent, the country across the sea would do well to reflect before resisting what will be the just demands of the American government regarding the sunken Maine.

While Russia strengthens her hold on Manchuria, and is even reported to have sent an army of ten thousand men into the province, and while she refuses to give any positive guaranty that she will not hold Port Arthur permanently, France has intimated to the British government that she has not the least intention of following the example of Russia and Germany by occupying Hainan as a naval base. At least so Mr. Curzon, of the foreign office, has informed parliament. Perhaps this assurance will not command perfect confidence, as the failure of France to keep her promises as to Madagascar is frequently recalled in parliament. Much more serious to us is the interference of Germany with American rights in China. The Chinese government has issued an imperial decree authorizing a Chinese syndicate, backed by American financiers, to construct a railroad from Tientsin through the Shantung province to Chin-kiang. The German minister intervened, claiming that only Germany had the right to construct any railroad in Shantung. Russia seems determined

to secure the control of the Chinese army, as Great Britain has of the customs. She insists that her military officers attached to the Chinese army shall have unreserved power over it. It is not strange that it is reported that China hesitates to grant the demand.

Bailly of Texas uttered a good thing in the debate on the appropriation resolution when he said: "I hope wise counsels will prevail, and that if war shall come, it will come from a great and sufficient cause. I have no sympathy with those rash and intemperate spirits who would provoke war simply for the sake of fighting, and yet I would rather follow them and suffer all the miseries and misfortunes their heedlessness would bring, than to follow those other contemptible, mercenary creatures, who are crying out for 'peace at any price.' Let us, in this way, adopt the motto our fathers in the elder and better days of this republic, and let us say to all the world, now, as then: 'We are ready to spend millions for defense, but not one cent for tribute.'"

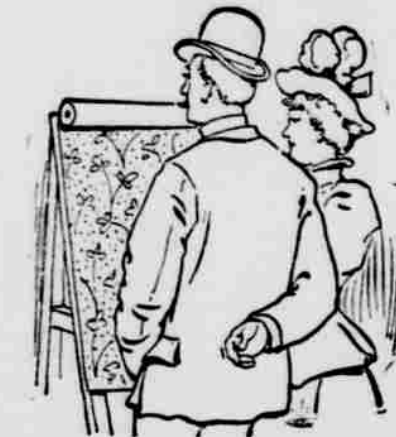
