In Trevitt precinct the polis will be located in the county court room, and C. E. Bayard, Frank Vogt and S. L. Brooks will act as judges at said election; and in West Dalles precinct the polis will be located at the City Mills, and W. D. Dart, C. M. Fouts and J. F. 




