THE VIRGINIUS AFFAIR.

Spain has deceived herself with the belief that the United States would bluster, but falter when the moment came for grim determination; and for this misconception of the temper of the American nation our own government is in part responsible. It is the direct outgrowth, says the Spokesman Review, of the Virginus affair of 1873, when the 10-year Cuban war was waging. The little steamer Virginus, with an American crew aboard, was captured by the Spaniards while filibustering off the Cuban coast. The prisoners were taken into the harbor of Santiago, summarily tried as pirates by drumhead courtmartial, in flagrant disregard of their treaty rights, and massacred with horrifying brutality. The temper of the people was for swift vengeance, but President Grant yielded to his strong desire to preserve peace and allow the wounds of the civil war to heal, and accepted a settlement on a small indemnity. This action implanted in the Spanish mind a belief that the Americans were essentially a mercenary people, and that misconception has never been eliminated.

Spain's "cocky" attitude throughout the Virginus affair was prompted largely by a belief that the United States was afraid to fight a foreign power, lest the unreconstructed element of the confederacy should seize the opportunity to make another dash for the "lost cause." This notion lingers still in the Spanish mind, and has found frequent expression during the present controversy.

The delegates who attend the state Republican convention should go to Astoria with one thought uppermost in their minds, and that should be to promote harmony in the party and unite the various factions which are keeping up the internecine feud in Multnomah county which is jeopardizing Republican success in the state. There will be a splendid opportunity at the Astoria convention for a display of unselfish statesmanship. If necessary let the present leaders, whose personality is objectionable, be retired and new men placed at the head of the party management; men whose ability and Republicanism are not objectionable, and who can command the respect and confidence of every Republican voter. There are such men in the party, and now is the time to bring them forth.

Those who like the sensational in politics will have it this year in the race in Multnomah county between W. T. Hume and Joseph Simon. These men are ancient enemies; they represent different factions of the Republican party; both are past masters in the art of politics, and neither wishes defeat. The battle will be a royal one and furnish much satisfaction and amusement to the fusionists, even if it doesn't to Republicans.

The delegates sent to the state convention have many important duties to perform, but none more so than to name good men for the legislative places on the ticket. An extra session is extremely improbable, and the next legislature will have to elect a successor. Let us have for once a legislature of which the state can be proud.

The exhibition of patience on the

part of the American people in this Spanish trouble is remarkable; but we believe it cannot stand much greater strain. President McKinley should not abuse the confidence and consideration shown him by longer delay. The Spaniards are full of tricks, and this asking for longer time in order that the case may be reopened is likely one of them.

The Oregonian may as well get in and support T. T. Geer for governor, as opposition to him is useless. If that paper wants to do a popular thing, now is its opportunity.
