

ARE FOR INTERVENTION

Senate Practically Agrees on a Resolution.

NO DECISION REACHED AS YET

It Will Also Declare in Favor of Requiring the Immediate Evacuation of the Island by Spain.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The senate foreign relations committee is understood to have practically decided on a resolution declaring for immediate intervention and requiring the evacuation of Cuba by Spain.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The foreign relations committee resumed its sitting this morning. They immediately took up the task of formulating a resolution defining its idea of the course to be pursued in the present complications with Spain. They are hopeful of being able to report today, but the report may be delayed so as to afford an opportunity to hear General Lee.

The committee is finding it a very difficult task to reach an agreement on the terms of the resolution. There is by no means the same unanimity as when they first met and decided to report the Foraker resolutions. The indications at the beginning of today's session were that there would be a return to the compromise proposition which was made prior to the reception of the message.

The committee remained together until noon, and then adjourned till 3:30, to hear General Lee. A formal vote was taken, but the committee knew what its report would be when it adjourned at noon. The result was not made public. The best information obtainable is that it will be a declaration for immediate intervention, and that no action on the part of Spain short of evacuation of the island will satisfy this country.

THE HOUSE COMMITTEE

No Agreement Reached and No Report to Be Made Today.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The Democrats of the house foreign affairs committee have agreed on a resolution of independence and armed intervention. The Republicans are divided still. The house committee will make no report today.

GRAIN ON THE RISE

Extraordinary Advances Secured on the Produce Exchange.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 12.—Both barley and wheat have made great and extraordinary advances on the produce exchange call board. The advance in May wheat from Saturday's figures is 10 3/4c a cental, or \$2.05 a ton, and in December options 16c a cental, equivalent to \$3.20 a ton.

In barley the advance is 12 and 10 1/2c a cental, while since Thursday May has gone up from \$1.15 to \$1.44, or 18 1/2c a cental, equal to \$3.65 a ton, and December from \$1.25 1/2 to \$1.41 1/2, or 15 1/2c a cental, or \$3.15 a ton.
