**WOMEN AS TEACHERS.**

The proportion largest in the United States and smallest in Germany.

There are in the United States, roughly speaking, 350,000 school teachers, and of this number 120,000 are men and 230,000 are women. In other words, there are nearly twice as many female as male teachers, and the disparity is increasing year by year. According to the last official census of Prussia there were 65,000 school teachers in the kingdom, of whom 9,000 were women and 56,000 men. It is evident, therefore, that the Prussian preference is for male teachers. In all Germany there are, including the government, church and private schools, 135,000 teachers, and the number of pupils is nearly 10,000,000. There are 140,000 teachers in France, of whom 65,000 are men and 75,000 are women, the number of each being subject to about the same ratio of increase. There are, it is supposed, about 100,000 teachers in Great Britain, but authentic figures are lacking.

**THE SULTAN'S TRIUMPH.**

The Story Told and Believed in Asia Minor and Central Asia.

The Indian Mohammedans heard that the caliph had triumphed over the infidel and the news went to the heads of the Mohammedans of Delhi and Oudh, just as now it has gone to the heads of the tribesmen of the frontier. In both cases it urged them, regardless of all consequences, to strike a blow for the faith. The descriptions that have been given of the Greek war to the frontiersmen are probably not unlike those of the Mohammedans of the Crimea that were given all over the Mohammedan world. The sultan, it was said, was attacked by the Russian dogs. Not caring to demean himself by fighting them in person he sent for his slaves, the French and the English, to drive them from his borders. This act the sultan's Christian slaves faithfully performed and for their loyalty he showed them some favor. But the caliph, the shadow of God, not to the tools he used, was due to destruction of the accursed Russians.

That was the story told throughout Asia Minor, North Africa and Central Asia, and piously believed. Doubtless the Afridis and the men of all the valleys and deserts from Ouetta to Chitral have heard similar extravagances in regard to the Greek campaign. The Greeks, they were doubtless told, are as much stronger and braver than the British as the British are stronger and braver than the Bengalese, yet these invincible warriors fled before the sultan.—London Spectator.

**SIDE COMBS NOW A NECESSITY.**

They Are Made in Costly Shell and Amber for Women of Wealth.

Despite the fact that small side combs for the hair come in such cheap imitations at present, and are so universally worn as to be positively common, they are an absolute necessity for the prevailing mode of hair dressing. It is impossible to maintain the broad effect at the side, which is de rigueur to-day without the aid of these combs, and though a fashionable woman cries out against a fashion which can be so easily copied by her less favored sisters, from a money point of view, she has no alternative but to accept the side comb, though in such a style and at such a price as to render it inaccessible to the woman whose pocket-book is not well filled.

The large jewelry stores, whose patrons are among the Four Hundred, have showcases filled with these beautiful little combs, and importers and manufacturers are constantly devising new styles, new methods of decoration, new shapes and new materials, from gold to shell.

The latest and most popular combs are small, of shell amber, and handsomely decorated with finely cut steel. Sometimes the steel is merely a narrow band of steel; again it is arabesque, or pointed, or rounded, or a series of fleur-de-lis or clover leaves. The variety is limitless, and as they are expensive and not very easily copied in a cheaper comb, they are considered very chic.

The matron of maiden possessing a stock of unset gems has her combs of gold or silver set with precious stones, and many women who are known to be the owners of beautiful jewels and who would never be suspected of wearing an imitation gem buy the almost perfect counterparts of their real gems, which are shown in the shops, in order to preserve their more expensive combs. They urge in explanation that the combs are so apt to fall out of the soft, fluffy rolls of hair.

Amber combs just at present seem to be more in favor than the darker shell, especially for a woman with moderately light or real blond hair. The most up-to-date ones are studded with colored stones for evening wear, and if carefully chosen to harmonize or contrast with the color of the hair these brilliant ornaments are very becoming.—Chicago Tribune.

**Rabbit, Not "Rabbit."**

Those who have accepted the inconsistent name of Welsh rabbit for toasted cheese on the assumption that it was a corruption of Welsh "rarebit," will have to revise their view.
