

Unknown Man Jumps From the Steamer Sarah Dixon and Makes the River His Grave.

Among the passengers who boarded the Sarah Dixon yesterday morning at Portland was a man who evidently had become tired of this life, and soon made up his mind to end his struggles by drowning himself in the seething waters of the Columbia river.

He was a middle-aged man, about 5 feet, 8 inches in height, dark grey eyes, dark hair, sprinkled with grey; he wore about a week's growth of whiskers, and his mustache was inclined to be dark. He appeared to be a laboring man, but was very slim and sickly looking, and certainly not able to work very hard. Those who noticed him particularly say that he acted strangely, and moved
