CARRIED TO THE SCAFFOLD.

Charles Flester Hanged at Grants Pass

Charles Fiester was hanged at Grant's Pass at 1:11 p. m. Thursday, and at 1:23 p. m. was pronounced dead by Drs. Myer and Devore, and cut down. Early Thursday morning, when Deputy Sheriff Fallen took Fiester his breakfast, he was surprised to find him apparently dying. He immediately called a doctor. It was at first thought that the prisoner had taken poison, and that he could not live until the hour set for his execution, but it was later seen that he had simply collapsed, and Sheriff Hiatt put the execution off until afternoon, in hopes that he might revive, but he did not. Sheriff Hiatt, assisted by Deputy Fallen, Sheriff elect Lister and Constable Colby, strapped Fiester to a board, carried him to the scaffold, drew did not even quiver.




