This morning at the Methodist church the Sunday school pupils will celebrate Children's day. The exercises will begin at 11 o'clock, and all are invited to be present. Every child is requested to carry a flag.

Wasco county burglars do things up brown. A few days ago the house of a man named Royal, near Hood River, was entered while the family was picking berries. Everything in the house was hurried away.

The La Grande Chronicle says a number of young girls between the ages of 10 and 12 years are working in the beet fields. They wear the regulation big overalls, and it is a difficult matter to tell them from the boys.

At the last meeting of the Columbia Hose company the members of the company decided to take part in the parade on July 4th. We would like very much to see the other companies join in as well and by so doing add to the display on that occasion.

The hot weather that has prevailed for the past week has been bad for Hood River strawberries. It caused them to ripen rapidly, the berries did not fill out, and many were too soft for shipment. Probably not more than half the crop had been gathered before the hot spell came on.

Matthew Smitham, aged 18 years, was shot and killed Sunday afternoon at Maldon, twenty miles east of Hailey, by Herman Scoble, a rancher, says the La Grande Chronicle. The boy and his uncle, John Smitham, who are sheep men, were packing their horses preparatory to moving camp when Scoble came along and shot Smitham's shepherd dog.

He then turned the rifle upon Smitham and fired, killing him. The sheriff is out after the murderer.

Last evening the members of Mr. Wm. Michell's Sunday school class gave a party on the lawn at the home of their Misses Glenn, in honor of one of their number, Miss Katie Sargent, who will leave with her grandparents this week for a visit in the East. The lawn was a regular fairy bower, and the hours were most pleasantly passed. A very few outside of the members of the class were present.

Many tons of wool are now arriving in Baker City for storage and future shipment, says the Democrat. The clip of 1898, both in quality and quantity, is excellent. The recent rains somewhat checked the hauling of this frizzly stuff, which goes to make our wearing apparel, but the good weather of the past few days has very rapidly improved the roads and freighting operations have been carried on very vigorously. There are in Baker county in the neighborhood of 60,000 head of sheep.

Tuesday the Sherman county Wood and Lumber Company, A. E. Lake, W. L. Vanderpool, G. W. and T. H. Johnson, of Dufur, incorporators, purchased land at Harris' farm on the Deschutes, six miles west of Moro, where they will conduct an elaborate business. Logs will be floated to mills at this point from the Metolis. When it is demonstrated that the getting of lumber in the log by this method is feasible, then the working capital of the company will be increased to place a complete plant at the place named for the manufacture of all kinds of lumber.

#### Weather Bureau Report.

Friday the maximum temperature over the Columbia river basin ranged from 78° to 96°, the lowest temperature being over the Snake river country. Friday night the temperature fell to 44° over the Snake river country, and to 64° over the upper Columbia. The Snake is rising slowly. The upper Columbia at Northport has risen one foot. At Umatilla the rise is .4 of a foot. As was stated on Monday last the rise began at Portland Friday afternoon and Saturday morning a rise of .2 of a foot was shown.

The upper river will continue to rise and thence will be more rapid during the next twenty-four hours. At Umatilla the rise for the next two days will rise at least .5 of a foot a day. At The Dalles the rise will be about a foot and at Portland about .5 of a foot. Beginning Tuesday morning the rise at Portland will probably be more rapid. About 22 feet will be shown at Portland next Thursday morning.

#### CARRIED TO THE SCAFFOLD.

Charles Fiester Hanged at Grants Pass While Unconscious.

Charles Fiester was hanged at Grant's Pass at 1:11 p. m. Thursday, and at 1:23 p. m. was pronounced dead by Drs. Myer and Devore, and cut down. Early Thursday morning, when Deputy Sheriff Fallen took Fiester his breakfast, he was surprised to find him apparently dying. He immediately called a doctor. It was at first thought that the prisoner had taken poison, and that he could not live until the hour set for his execution, but it was later seen that he had simply collapsed, and Sheriff Hiatt put the execution off until afternoon, in hopes that he might revive, but he did not. Sheriff Hiatt, assisted by Deputy Fallen, Sheriff-elect Lister and Constable Colby, strapped Fiester to a board, carried him to the scaffold, drew the black cap over his face, adjusted the noose and sprung the trap. Fiester shot straight downward 5 feet 10 inches, and did not even quiver.

The gallows upon which he was hanged was built for his execution November 29, 1895, and is the same upon which Meison was hanged July 2, 1897.

R. G. Smith, Fiester's attorney, did everything possible to save his client, and Fiester had faith that he would prevail on Governor Lord to intercede up to a late hour last night. When informed that nothing could be done, he began breaking down.

Fiester was hanged for the murder of his wife. The crime was committed May 19, 1895, near the railroad track, five miles north of Grant's Pass, in the presence of his three youngest children, the eldest of whom was only 10 years old.

#### DEATH OF ANDREW DONALDSON

The Old Gentleman Passes Peacefully Away Friday Evening.

Friday evening Andrew Donaldson, an old resident of this city, died at the farm of M. A. Cushing, near The Dalles. He has been sick for some time, and although he had some means, of late he was an object of charity with his numerous friends.

His last years were far from being filled with happiness. About three months ago his daughter, Laura, who up to that time had taken care of the old gentleman, was committed to the insane asylum at Salem, and only for the assistance of friends, he would have been destitute.

He was 77 years old and has lived in The Dalles for the last thirteen years. The funeral will take place from Crandall & Burgett's undertaking parlors at 4 o'clock this afternoon. The body will be interred in the Odd Fellows cemetery.

Friends of the deceased are requested to attend.

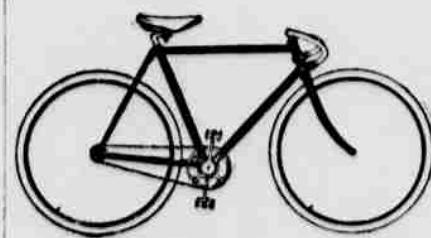
#### FRANK EPP DEAD.
