Word was received in the city Thursday evening of the death of a former Dalles man, George Rauth, at Goldendale yesterday afternoon at the home of Harry Dunn, of that place. About three years ago Mr. Rauth worked for Ben Wilson in this city, and was well known and had many friends here. While in the Willamette valley he was taken sick and came east of the mountains in hopes that his health would be benefited. The deceased was about 27 years old, and leaves a wife, who resides at Arlington, to mourn his loss. The funeral took place at Goldendale yesterday and was largely attended by friends of the deceased from The Dalles and other places.

Citizens of The Dalles who have seen the city growing steadily each day, fail to realize what an improvement has been going on, in spite of our reverses by fire, and what a beautiful city we have. A reporter, in company with a friend who formerly lived in The Dalles, but has not been here for years, took a drive over the city last evening, pointing out the changes and comparing the old Dalles with the new, which led the visitor to remark: "Oh, how much the old home has improved, and what fine residences you now have; as well as business blocks equal to those in many large cities." We may well feel proud to point out while so doing the beautiful scenery around us.

Miss Lillian Stroggin, daughter of T. J. Scroggin, of Long Creek, was the victim a few days ago of an accident that may prove fatal. The family was camping in the mountains near McDuffee springs, and Miss Lillian and her mother were using the wagon bed for a sleeping-place. In attempting to step from the rear of the wagon to the ground the girl's dress became caught in the vehicle and she tripped and fell heavily, striking a projecting corner of the box, breaking a blood vessel, dislocating her knee, and fracturing a bone in her hip. It was two days before medical attendance could be had, and in the meantime one side of the unfortunate girl became paralyzed. Her chances for recovering are about even.

### Reduced Rates.

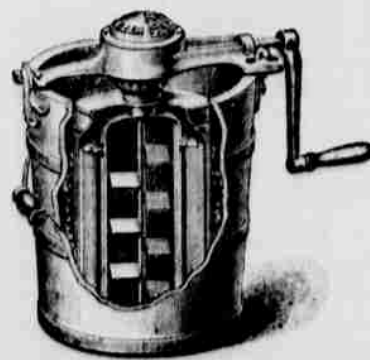
