Columbia river basin. The rivers con-
tinue to fall. The fall will continue at
about the same rate for the next four or
five days which has prevailed during the
past three. For today the forecast is

fair weather with variable winds over
the Pacific Northwest.

tioned at the termination of the parade.

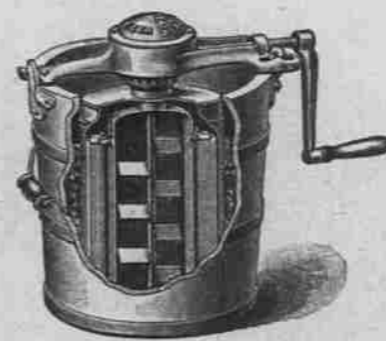
