At St. Mary's hospital in Walla Walla, last week, Dr. N. G. Ballock performed a remarkable surgical operation on Miss Carrie Stone, of Athena, who for some time been suffering from stomach trouble, her death being but a question of a short time, was taken to the hospital to be operated on as a last resort. Dr. Ballock and his assistant removed from her stomach a large mass of black hair, or a dermoid cyst growth. It measured 32 inches in length, and 5 inches in diameter, and weighed six pounds. Last night Ward Lewis, the eight-year-old son of Mrs. Mary J. Lewis, of Kingsley, died of scarlet fever. The little fellow has been sick for some time and his death was not unexpected. He was an intelligent little boy and his death will be a sad blow to his widowed mother. Dr. Logan was called yesterday afternoon to attend the little sufferer, but he arrived too late to render any assistance.
