F. W. Schmidt, of Mt. Olive, Iowa, a brother of Chas. Schmidt, of this city, has accepted a position in the Snipes-Kinersly Drug Co.'s store, where he will act as prescription clerk in the future.

Thursday Sheriff Kelly turned over to County Treasurer Phillips \$3632.26, taxes collected since July 25th. The tax rolls were delivered to Mr. Kelly on the 22nd, and he has been rustling delinquents up the past week.

The Whitman County Fair Association is making arrangements for holding its annual fair and fruit exhibit. The date for the fair has not yet been fixed, but the society announces that it will probably be held just after the close of the Spokane fruit fair.

Yesterday a party of Portland sight-seers arrived on the Dalles City and are registered at the Unatilla House. The party consists of Mrs. E. B. and W. E. Coman, Helen M. Coman, Mrs. M. Zan, Miss May McGuire and Henry M. Fall, of St. Helena, Calif. Like so many others, they came to view the beautiful scenery of the Columbia.

Yesterday several wool sales were made in this city, and although the

price was not made known, it is thought that it was not less than fifteen cents. The wool markets have fairly opened up, and henceforth the sales will be numerous and the wool, which is now piling up in the warehouses, will soon be en route to the mills in various parts of the country.

On Sunday, August 7th, the seventh grand excursion from The Dalles to Hood River, Cascade Locks, Bonneville and Multnomah Falls will be held. Fare for the round trip 50 cents. This excursion offers a rare opportunity for a Sunday outing at any of those points.

Yesterday Cram & Butler, of Cross Keys, delivered ninety head of splendid beef cattle at the stockyards in this city. The cattle have been purchased by C. M. Grimes for the Union Meat Co. at Portland. The price paid was three cents per pound for steers and 2 1/2 for cows. The band was shipped to Troutdale yesterday afternoon.

Sheriff F. W. Darbin, of Marion county, Wednesday made service of papers on the defendant in a foreclosure suit by forwarding the documents to his address at Cavite, Philippine islands, by mail. The case in question is that of the State Board of School Land commissioners against Edwin Grim. The defendant is first lieutenant of company F, Second regiment, Oregon volunteers, and is now at Cavite, near Manila, with his command.

paid; were poorly fed and could not stand the climate. Chris Fulnam and M. S. Rinehart, two other members of the party, left Central America at the same time, and will spend some time visiting in the Eastern states before returning home.

Reports from the farmers in all sections of the Inland Empire state this year's crop is above expectations. The grain is plump and well filled and is yielding unusually well in almost every part of Wasco and Sherman counties. In this regard the yield in the Inland Empire differs from that in the Willamette. In Marion county the wheat is tall and fine looking grain, but it does not turn out when threshed like the grain in Eastern Oregon.

Yesterday Eugene W. Vest, the representative of the Majestic Range Manufacturing Co., of St. Louis, was in the city. Mr. Vest left for points East last evening, and informs us that his intention is to visit The Dalles in the near future, and bring the little pickanninies who were here last summer and furnished our townspeople with a fund of amusement. They are as funny as ever and will play several days and probably a week's engagement in this city.

Farmers from different parts of Sherman, Klickitat and Wasco counties state that harvesting is in full blast in all three counties. In Sherman much grain is being prepared for market by means of the combined harvesters, while in Wasco and Klickitat counties the herders and threshers are used principally to harvest the crop. The reason that combines are not used more extensively in Wasco county is that the fields are comparatively small and the ground too rough for such large machines. In the level fields of Sherman county, however, the combines work perfectly.

Notwithstanding the fact that a launching of some craft or other has been almost a weekly occurrence in Portland for the last few months, there was a large crowd to witness the initial plunge of Hale & Kern's new tugboat Samson from the ways at the Wolf & Zwicker iron works Thursday. Madison street bridge and neighboring places of vantage were occupied by a surging mass of humanity from early in the afternoon until the new acquisition to the Portland fleet was tied up at Duniway's wharf, on the East Side. The launch was a complete success in every respect.

The prognostications of Local Forecast Official Fagne point to thunder showers probably today and cooler, with west to north winds. An area of low pressure has developed and was central yesterday morning over Southern Oregon and Northern California. An area of high pressure is developing off the southwestern coast of California, which will move northward and give cool weather Sunday and Monday. From the low pressure, thunder showers are probable on Saturday over the greater portion of the Pacific Northwest; cooler weather today is expected as a result of the thunder showers.

The steamer Dalles City arrived here last night and is now ready to contend with the Regulator for the title of the "Pride of The Dalles." The steamer in every regard is new and as a hull has been built under it, the contractors had the advantage of knowing the faults of the old craft which they corrected in the new boat. Although the boilers are not fully tempered, which prevents it being put under a full head of steam, at the same time the Dalles City made a splendid run from Portland, which will be greatly excelled when the boat is on the route for a short time.

### SOMETHING ABOUT THE FOREST FIRES

NEW FEDERAL LAW WILL BE ENFORCED.

Oregon to Be Protected Against Fall of Smoke, and Sheep Kept From the Reserve.

The department of the interior at Washington last summer published a notice calling the attention of the public to the fact that immense areas of public forest are annually destroyed by fire, originating, in many instances, through the carelessness of prospectors, campers, hunters, sheep-herders and others; while in many instances the fires are started with malicious intent.

Warning was given that the origin of all forest fires would be carefully investigated, and, where the fire is ascertained have originated through carelessness or design, the persons implicated will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law. The public generally was requested to aid the officers of the government in their effort to check the evils referred to and in the punishment of all such offenders.

The act of congress, approved February 24, 1897, provides that any person who willfully or maliciously sets fire to timber or underbrush on the public domain, or carelessly leaves fire to burn unattended near any timber or inflammable material, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not more than \$5,000 or be imprisoned not more than two years, or both. Any person who builds a campfire, or other fire, in or near any forest, timber, or other inflammable material on the public domain, and fails before breaking camp or leaving said fire to totally extinguish the same, shall be fined not more than \$1000 or be imprisoned not more than one year, or both.

The fines collected shall be paid into the public school fund of the county in which the lands where the offense was committed are situated.

Capt. S. B. Ormsby, of Salem, was appointed forest supervisor for this state, and Mr. Dufur, superintendent for the northern district. They, with their gang of forest rangers, have been instructed by Binger Hermann, commissioner of the general land office, to make every effort to check the fires or punish the offenders.

The commissioner, mindful of the fact that the water supply of Portland would be greatly damaged if sheep were herded on the watershed of Bull Run lake and river, has instructed them to keep sheep out of all portions of the Bull Run reserve and that portion of the Cascade reserve north of the Barlow road and west of the east fork of Hood River.

Between the Barlow road and the east fork, the boundary line extends from the point where the road crosses Summit creek northeasterly about six miles to the east of the east fork of Hood river. Capt. Ormsby has recently had this line marked by blazes on the trees, two or three rods apart. He will be very careful to prevent any roaming sheep-herder with his flock from trespassing within the limits described.

Yesterday morning Lloyd Laughlin, son of B. F. Laughlin, was playing with the dog at their camp at Glenwood when in some way he got tripped and falling on a sharp rock, cut a deep gash over the left eye. Fearing the result if the wound was not attended to at once, Mr. Hinkle hitched up the horses and, accompanied by his wife and Mrs. Laughlin, brought the little boy to White Salmon, being compelled to make double-quick time in order to catch the boat. On reaching this city, Dr. Sutherland was called and dressed the wound, which proved to be not a dangerous one, but in need of immediate attention. They will return to camp today.

Frank J. Beaty, of Wamic, who recently returned from a trip from the valley via of the Barlow road, informs us that a forest fire had been started seven miles east of Government camp and threatened to destroy millions of feet of splendid timber of all kinds. He had no means of stopping the conflagration and advises that means be taken by the forestry agents to do something immediately. The fire was, according to his reckoning, about one mile east of the summit and 118 miles from Portland. If the fire is not stopped it is impossible to estimate the damage that will be done and the matter should be looked into immediately.

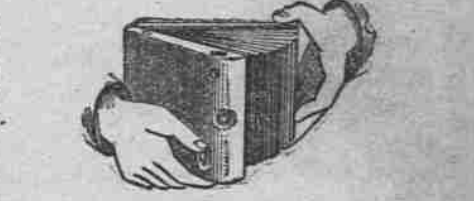
