bunch of good grapes until of late years when the fear of swallowing some of the seeds and causing that dreaded disease, appendecitis, has taken away the pleasure. The following from Dr. Andrew Wilson, of London, should dispel this dread: "I have received several letters of late, reiterating a question I might well be tired of answering: Do tomatoes cause cancer? But for the fact that one takes a pleasure in stamping one's foot on a misleading statement calculated to prejudice people against a vegetable food which is entirely healthful and safe, I should grow weary of asserting that not a jot or tittle of proof has ever been offered in support of the outrageous statement noted above. One might as well allege that cabbage causes cancer, for there would be no more proof to be had concerning the tomato myth. I can only repeat that the tomatce is an excellent vegetable enough, and may be partaken of by those with whom it agrees, with-
