Yesterday thirteen cars of stock sheep were shipped to North Dakota by R. H. Guthrie. He feels that range in Eastern Oregon is getting too scarce to make the business profitable, and he has resolved to ship all his sheep to Dakota.

C. H. Valentine, the assistant general organizer of the endowment rank, Knights of Pythias, for Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Nevada, Wyoming, Montana, Colorado and Utah, spent yesterday in the city and left for Heppner on the 5:20 train last evening.

Hon. F. N. Jones, of Sherar's Bridge, returned on the Spokane local last evening from California, where he has been visiting his sister who has been very sick. Mr. Jones is pleased to be back to Oregon once more on account of the extreme heat which he says was even worse in California than in Eastern Oregon.

Some residents in the neighborhood of St. Mary's Academy complain again that some hoodlum boys visit their gardens in the evening and steal grapes, etc. The boys are well known and should they try again to commit like depredations they will receive a reprimand that will leave a lasting impression on their mind and body.

On next Friday evening Mr. and Mrs. I. N. Sargent, of this city, will celebrate the sixtieth anniversary of their wedding, at their home on Liberty street. Mr. and Mrs. Sargent may be reckoned among the pioneers of this state and are highly respected by all who know them. Invitations have been issued to many of their friends to be present, and the old couple have the congratulations of all on this happy event.

The enterprise of the Seufert-Condor Telephone Company was never better demonstrated than just after the recent fire. Scarcely had the flames been subdued until they had a crew of men on the ground digging holes, re-setting poles and stretching wire. So rapidly did they rush the work that all the damage done was repaired last night and the exchange is once more in perfect working

order. Work is also being pushed by the Electric Light Company to get their line in shape, and we will have lights again about tomorrow evening.

H. W. Canfield, C. L. McKenzie, John Whithers, John Cannatt and J. F. Richardson were elected Saturday as delegates to the populist state convention at Ellensburg. The friends of C. W. Bushnell, of Rosalia, claim that the delegates named favor his nomination for congress, and that Bushnell will go to the state convention with 20 of the 35 delegates from Whitman county. They admit that L. C. Crow of Palouse, who is a candidate for the congressional nomination, will have 10 delegates.

The preliminary examination of Chas. Deckert charged, with having stolen rifles from Mays & Crowe on the night of the fire, was held before Recorder Gates yesterday. As no evidence of importance could be found against him to sustain the charge, Deckert was dismissed. Henry Wickman who is held for the same charge will have his hearing at 10 o'clock today. Atty. E. B. Dufur will appear for the defendant, while District Attorney Jayne will appear in behalf of the state. It is generally believed that the boy is innocent of the charge and that he will be released.

Yesterday Mrs. D. A. Sturgess, of Mosier, brought in a sample of a new variety of prunes, known as the "Tenant." About three years ago they secured one of the trees as an experiment, and they find that this variety is superior even to the Italian prune, since it ripens earlier and will remain on the tree longer than the other varieties. Mrs. Sturgess informs us that last season some of the Tenant prunes were on the trees in good condition in the latter part of September. In a short time they will experiment in evaporating the prunes, and if they prove a success they will put out a large number of trees of variety.

Among the numerous losers in the recent fire there were probably none who suffered so severe a loss as Louie Comini. Shortly before the fire he put in a large stock of costly tombstones and all were destroyed, leaving him after years of hard labor almost penniless with a wife and family on his hands. He has numerous friends, however, who are ready to help him. They will immediately assist him in raffling the pet goat which is such a favorite among the young folks around town. Everyone should lend a helping hand in such a cause as this. It is hard to tell when a like misfortune may befall us and place us in like straits so that assistance of friends would be needed as in this case.

T. Allen McQuary Arrives in the City on His Strange Mission Around the World for an Arkansaw Girl and \$5000 00.

Notice to Delinquent Taxpayers.

The delinquent taxes of Wasco county, as shown on the rolls now in the hands of the sheriff are \$60,000, an amount almost equal to the indebtedness of the county. Every citizen will doubtless admit that this state of affairs should not exist, and that all taxes should be collected. On account of hard times in the past the county court has shown leniency to taxpayers, but that leniency has reached the limit, and the court cannot wait longer on delinquents to make settlements. For this reason a warrant has been attached to each delinquent roll commanding the sheriff to collect all taxes by seizure and sale of property. With a bountiful crop now in sight, there can no longer be any reasonable excuse for the non-payment of taxes. The sheriff is bound by oath to comply with the terms of the warrants attached to the tax rolls for the collection thereof, and has no option in the matter. Delinquent taxpayers can save the cost of seizure and sale of property by settling their taxes at once.
