WHAT VOLUNTEERS LACKED.

The last number of the Army and Navy Journal contains an article that points out the necessity of discipline in diet and habit among troops in active service. The writer shows that the regular army has the advantage over volunteers because the latter resent regulations as to food as an interference with their presonal rights and privileges. Surgeons have little difficulty in handling regulars, but find it almost impossible to control sick or convalescent volunteers. In the present war certain rules were prescribed for campaigns in the tropics. The regular officers insisted on the observance of these whenever possible. The volunteers as a rule laughed at them.


