**Notice to Delinquent Taxpayers.**  
The delinquent taxes of Wasco county, as shown on the rolls now in the hands of the sheriff are \$60,000, an amount almost equal to the indebtedness of the county. Every citizen will doubtless admit that this state of affairs should not exist, and that all taxes should be collected. On account of hard times in the past the county court has shown leniency to taxpayers, but that leniency has reached the limit, and the court cannot wait longer on delinquents to make settlements. For this reason a warrant has been attached to each delinquent roll commanding the sheriff to collect all taxes by seizure and sale of property. With a bountiful crop now in sight, there can no longer be any reasonable excuse for the non-payment of taxes. The sheriff is bound by oath to comply with the terms of the warrants attached to the tax rolls for the collection thereof, and has no option in the matter. Delinquent taxpayers can save the cost of seizure and sale of property by settling their taxes at once.

**LA FAYETTE'S NEGLECTED TOMB**  
Monument to Be Erected Over the Forgotten Resting Place.

In Paris there is a convent and garden known through the immortal Hugo's "Les Miserables." It is the convent of the Petit Picpus. In the grounds of this convent is a small cemetery where nearly 1500 victims of the guillotine were buried indiscriminately. Here also repose the bones of La Fayette beside those of his wife, who wished to be buried there. The resting place of La Fayette, generally unknown and forgotten, is marked only by a plain granite slab. Upon a register kept by the concierge of the convent there are inscribed the names of but a very small number of casual visitors.

In view of these facts the "La Fayette Memorial Commission" has been formed for the purpose of erecting a monument to the memory of La Fayette as a twentieth century tribute from the people of this nation, to be unveiled with fitting ceremony on July 4th, 1900, and thus grandly celebrate United States Day at the Paris exposition. It is proposed that the cost of the undertaking, which is estimated to approximate a quarter of a million dollars, shall be defrayed by small contributions secured through the agency of the school children throughout the country.

The dedication of this monument, secured and built through the efforts of the young people of this country, will make conspicuously resplendent our United States day at the Paris exposition of 1900.

No country will find such a basis for the celebration of its national day in Paris; but all the nations of the earth will unite with us in the dedication of this beautiful memorial, a tribute which shall forever mark the grave of La Fayette, whose memory is consecrated in the hearts of men.

It requires no argument to convince the liberty-loving people of America of the far-reaching value of this most fitting, opportune and significant movement. It will promote patriotism and implant in the minds of our young generation, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, a broader knowledge of their country's history.

It is proposed that the president ask the governors of the states to especially designate October 19, 1898, as La Fayette Day in every school district throughout the land, when our children will be told of the struggle for liberty, and they may then contribute their help and pennies to the memory of the defender of their nation.

**THE PLAN SUGGESTED.**  
The committee has decided on October 19th, the anniversary of the surrender of Cornwallis, at Yorktown, as the day which the schools of the United States are asked to recognize as La Fayette Day. On this day, it is hoped by concerted effort to raise ample funds to build the monument on a scale commensurate with the occasion.

In the universities and colleges of the land, the heads of the institutions are asked to appoint committees from their students to arrange and carry out public exercises suited to the idea; embracing perhaps historic drama, patriotic drama, etc., charging an admission fee or collecting voluntary contributions as the local conditions may suggest, and turning the proceeds over to the president of the college, who shall forward it to the treasurer of the memorial committee.

The foregoing suggestions are tentative and may be changed to suit the local conditions.
