Miss Davenport has played in every important city of the United States, in such roles as La Tosca, Gismonda and Cleopatra, with her husband as her opposite. Her plays were all produced on a splendid and lavish scale, and with such success that the celebrated actress amassed a fortune in the practice of her art, being classed among the few really wealthy stage celebrities of the country. Many Dalles people were fortunate in hearing her on her last engagement in Portland two years ago when she played La Tesca and Gismonda.

Fanny Davenport was born in London. England, April 10, 1850. A mere child she appeared in "Metamora" at the Athensem, in Boston, and that was the beginning of a career that has covered a period of more than thirty-five years.
