SIMON SENATOR.

Last night at the state capital the Republican members met in caucus, after being advised that Mr. Corbett had withdrawn, and selected Hon. Joseph Simon as the nominee for senator, and today his nomination was ratified.

While THE CHRONICLE would have preferred a man less identified with one faction, yet it believes that his selection is much preferable to any other man of that faction. He is a young man and a tireless worker. He can unite the Republican party of Oregon. This paper believes that he will.

Mr. Fulton's recent speech in the senate, in opposition to Selling, of Multnomah, who had opposed an appropriation for an examination of the Columbia river to ascertain the best means of opening the same, characterize him as a friend of an open river, regardless of reports that all Astorians were opposing appropriations, looking to improvements of the river and the removal of the obstructions at Celilo.

Corbett will be laid on the shelf, in any event, if Simon can muster forty-six votes. This has been the plan all along. Simon instead of Corbett any time, but it would be better if all factions were turned down for a compromise candidate.

Notice is hereby given that the order of the President of January 31, 1898, permanently reserving the following described tracts or parcels of land for the use of a boat-railway between The Dalles and Celilo, on the south side of the Columbia river, has been revoked. Said tracts described as follows: One tract situated in the NW 1/4 of Sec. 31, T. 2 N., R. 14 E., containing about four and one-half acres (no other description). The other tract in the NW 1/4, Sec. 21, T. 2 N., R. 15 E., containing about one-half of an acre, particularly described as follows: Beginning at the northwest corner of said section 21, and running thence in a southerly direction along the west boundary line of said section 21, one hundred and seventy (170) feet to a point on said boundary line; thence in a straight line to a point on the north boundary line of said section 21, distant two hundred and sixty (260) feet in a southerly direction from the point of beginning; and thence in a westerly direction along the north boundary line of said section 21 to the point of beginning. In accordance with the provisions of the Act of June 4, 1897 (30 Stat. 39), upon the recommendation of the Secretary of the Interior, the west half of Township one South, of Range ten East, Williams-Meridian, Oregon, within the limits of the Cascade Range Forest Reserve, is hereby ordered restored to the public domain, after sixty days notice hereof, by publication as required by law, it appearing that said tract is better adapted to agricultural than forest purposes.
