WE'RE NOT SO BAD AFTER ALL

The severe shock recently suffered by the estimable Queen of Great Britain and Ireland regarding the scandalous state of affairs in the management of her drawing-rooms has created considerable discussion in the English newspapers over the prevalence of corruption among the so called upper classes.

The shock which shook the Queen was the immediate result of an investigation which revealed the fact that certain titled men and women, close to the throne, were engaged in selling the right of presentation at sums ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000. The father, mother, or husband of a woman who was anxious to be honored by a drawing-room presentation, it appears, found it necessary to make application in certain quarters. Certain quarters would make the necessary inquiries. If certain quarters were satisfied as to the eligibility of the applicant for distinction, one hint would lead to another until an agreement as to the amount of money necessary to make everything smooth was reached, when the presentation would take place according to the card.

What bothers the English newspapers is, perhaps, that following so closely upon the revelations in the Hooley case, this evidence of corruption among the nobility renders useless temporarily a large amount of "copy" regarding the moral decrepitude of a Republican form of government as exhibited by the exposures made by newspapers in the United States. The editorial writers whose specialty it is to draw invidious comparisons between morality under a monarchy and immorality under a democracy are practically thrown out of business. Their occupation is gone. If they mention a case of official corruption or a case of private defalcation in the United States it only serves to remind their readers of the Hooley and drawing-room scandals. The less the British commoner is reminded of these things the better it is for the British commonwealth, and hence the subject of dishonesty under a democracy is at present deemed unworthy of notice.

The worst phase of the situation from a monarchical view point is the fact that the more intelligent people of the United States have never been associated as a class with the corruption alleged to be prevalent on this side of the Atlantic. Whatever may be said of us as a people, our respectable classes have the reputation of a remarkably honest and upright people.

THE FRENCH CRISIS.

Will France be able to avert the impending peril of a military dictatorship? That will depend upon the quality of contemporary French statesmanship.

In the play of "Richelieu" Bulwer causes the great cardinal to declare that "Beneath the rule of men entirely great the pen is mightier than the sword," an epigram often misapplied and perverted. Richelieu was referring to the pen as directed by the statesman, not by the literateur. He understood the weakness of military men—their vanity, their ignorance of the great currents of popular thought and sentiment, their impractical conceptions of affairs apart from the army, and above all else their intense spirit of envy. He knew with what consummate power the genius of statesmanship can play on these foibles, and thus array one general against another general, or even one wing of an army in opposition to another wing.

France's great need in the existing

crisis, as in all other crises threatening the creation of a military dictatorship, is wise, determined and patriotic statesmanship. If these shall be developed by the demand of the hour, the ship of state will outride the storm and glide into safe waters.—Spokesman-Review.

The Spaniards have abandoned all hope of retaining a grip on Porto Rico and Cuba, and are now going to struggle to hold a coaling station, at least, in the Philippines. But even this will be denied them. The Spaniards must henceforth confine their operations to Spain.

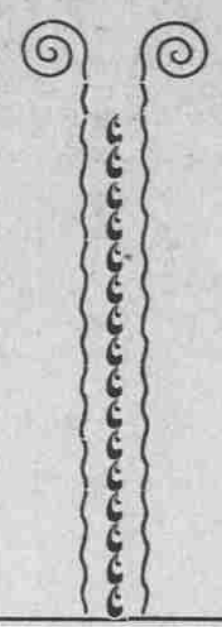

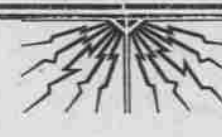
