Noble Conduct of Our Men at the Defeat of Cervera.

Their Humane Acts Stand Out a Gleams of Light Among the Shadows of a Bloody Battle-Some Notable Instances.

Nothing could speak more impresthe scenes depicted in the defeat of Admiral Cervera. They furnish another confirmation of the saying that 'the bravest are the tenderest." The vanquished Spaniards that day before Santiago, naked, wounded and dying in the wreckage of their burning and battered ships, found our men no less prompt and ready in every gentle courtesy and kindly ministry, when the time and the opportunity came giving them battle when that stern duty had been theirs.

Nothing more chivalrous is conceivable than the act of Capt. Evans in refusing to receive the proffered sword of Capt. Eulate, of the Vizenya, when that officer stepped on board the Iowa. wounded and a prisoner. The Spanard's cup of humiliation was already full to overflowing, and Capt. Evans was not the man to needlessly add another drop. And so, the account runs, the waved aside the sword with a friendly gesture and grasped the hand of the Spaniard and welcomed his brother officer to the hospitality of the It is not surprising that Capt. Eulate, brave man that he is, was deeply touched by this magnanimous action, and responded to it by asking to meet the Iown's officers, to each of whom he gave a word of gratitude before he was carried below. Afterwards Capt. Eulate told Admiral Cervera that it was the proudest moment of his life when the gallant American commander allowed him to retain his treasured blade.

Another striking scene was enacted on the deck of the Iowa when Admiral Cervera came on board after being rescued in the surf by a boat from the Gloucester. The reception given to the veteran Spanish warrior could hardly have been heartier had he been one of our victorious leaders instead of a captive foe. The full marine guard was paraded, the bugles flourished a salute, and many hands were extended in cordial greeting.

The conduct and bearing of Cervera throughout all the sad and trying scenes since his downfall have been in perfect keeping with his chivalrous action in sending prompt assurance to our fleet of the safety of Lieut. Hobson and his comrades, after the sink-ing of the Merrimae. He has borne himself like a true soldier and an honorable gentleman being appreciative and quickly responsive to every act of kindness on the part of those around him. He is said to have been specially affected by the humanity and zeal displayed by our surgeons toward his wounded, and, in token of his appreciation, he gave to one of them. Dr. Crandall, his autograph, saying simply that he had no other souvenir to offer, having lost "all but his honor."

He showed the same appreciative sense when he thanked Lieutenant Commander Wainwright and Lieut. Huse, of the Gloucester, for the manner in which they had stood by the Maria Teresa, whose heated guns made a fearful danger zone, and whose maggzine threatened to dash the life from everyone near by. It does not pass around the hip like other trusses, but over the hips; the silver wire lying in the hollow of side, thereby allowing the free movement of the hips and limbs, allowing the wearer to stride out freely, and doing away with the fear and dread that something will so wrong that usually attends the wearing of other trusses.

Its lightness is featherweight in comparison with other trasses. It is so light the wearer scarcely knows he has anything on, and this is a great comfort, enab-ling the wearer to forget his ailments.

It can be altered by the weater to the shape of the body, not being made of hardened steel, and can, with a little judicious and careful bending, be made stronger or weaker in pressure, as


