The house remained in session, and after some time spent in consideration decided to retain all its old officers and last fall, with the exception of Griffin, the seargent-at-arms, who was onsted.

The house then took up and passed the current resolution providing for a committee to audit the books of the state treasurer.

Another resolution was immediately afterward acted upon providing for the appointment of a committee to confer Yesterday, between this city and with a like body from the legislative asindustry on the Columbia river.

The house then adjourned until 2 o'clock in the afternoon.
