CRADLE OF GENIUS.

Commissary General Eagan entered the army from Washington territory, and after the civil war saw service at Fort Colville and other northwestern posts.

General Miles may also be fairly claimed as a Washingtonian. For five years, from 1880 to 1885, he was in command of the department of the Columbia, with headquarters at Vancouver. His record proves him to have been a military genius. Without West Point training, he left the drygoods counter to enlist as a private in the civil war, and though without political influence, he rose, by sheer merit, to the rank of brevet brigadier-general before he was thirty years of age.

Washington and Oregon have been the cradle of military genius. Grant saw service at Vancouver, Walla Walla and other northwestern posts; and Sheridan, as a young subaltern, received his baptism of fire in the gallant fight with the Indians at the Cascades of the Columbia.

Sherman had service on the Pacific coast, although he did not come north of California; but Hooker at one time had charge of the military roads in Oregon. Brigadier General Kautz was at Fort Steilacoom in the 50s, and many others who have risen to distinction won their spurs in Washington and Oregon.—Spokesman Review.

Bryan is still against expansion and Croker is for it. This shows that on this as on most of the really important issues the Democracy is now, as it usually has been, a house divided against itself. Croker has the sentiment of all the progressive people in the country on his side, but to this extent his position is un-Democratic. The majority of the party to which he ostensibly belongs is against him. Bryan is opposed by probably two-thirds of the voters of the country, but he has a majority of the voters of his party with him. This consideration counts for a great deal with Bryan, for in his role as perpetual presidential aspirant it will be necessary for him to have the caucuses and conventions of his party favorable. There is a strong probability that if the Democratic convention were held today Bryan would be nominated. So long as this pleasing prospect continues the Republicans are assured of a majority of at least 150 in the electoral college of 1900.

The Filipinos who object because Gen. Otis signs himself "military governor" are entirely too sensitive. Military government is inevitable for a time when a country changes hands, and this presupposes a military governor. In fact, the Filipinos are showing an ignorance of the requirements of the position in which the United States and themselves are placed which proves that they have much to learn before they can safely be placed in charge of their local affairs. The military government will be established all over the islands, and the duration of this regime will depend largely on the tractability and sanity of the Filipinos in conforming to that government's requirements.

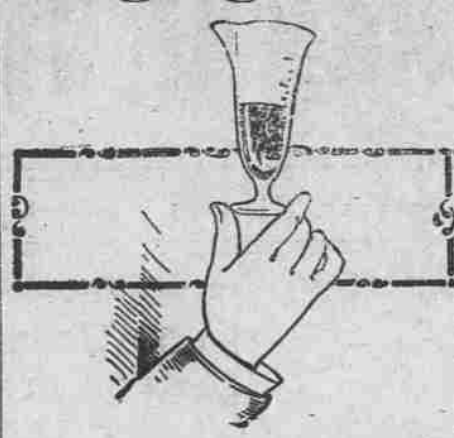

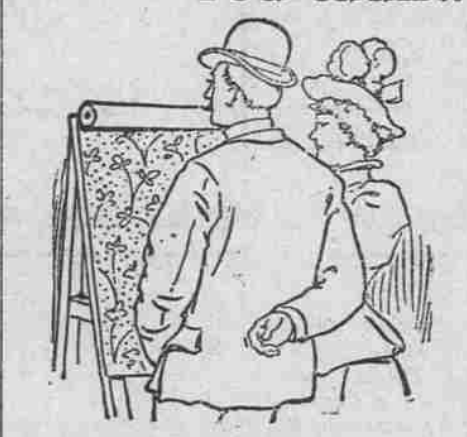
