## ADMIRAL KAUTZ WILL INVESTIGATE

Upon His Report in Samoa Will Be Based the Demands to Be Made on Germany.

New York, Jan. 26.—A dispatch to the Herald from Washington says: Rear-Admiral Kautz has been instructed upon his arrival with the 'Philadelphia' at Apia to investigate the Samoan situation and report the facts to the department.

Reinforced by this report the department will be able to follow up its demands to the German government through Ambassador White, provided the report confirms the dispatches sent by Consul-General Osborne.

The department officials believe that the Philadelphia, under the orders telegraphed to Rear-Admiral Kautz, will leave San Diego Thursday for Honolulu enroute to Apia. The vessel may be delayed in case Chief Engineer A. B. Chase should not put in an appearance. It is expected that within fifteen days the cruiser will reach her destination.

### Cyclone Swept South Sea.

VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 26.—The steamer Aorangi, from Australasia, brings details of the terrible cyclone which swept the South seas about the middle of Dec., devastating villages, wrecking shipping and causing many deaths.

At Samarai, in New Guinea, on December 11, the gale was terrific. Cocoa palms went down by hundreds and were carried to sea. Torrents of rain fell. Twelve vessels were lost.

In the Solomons the hurricane did the most damage, whole villages being destroyed. Hundreds of the plantations were uprooted and yam patches leveled. Over 500 natives are reported to have been killed.

Captain Pentecost, of the yacht St. Aubin, who brought the news of the disaster to Sydney, says he saved a woman who was to have been killed as a sorceress, she being accused of having caused the hurricane. He bought her, the purchase price being a pig, and took her to another island, where she was released.

### Stabbed by a Pupil.

ALBANY, Mo., Jan. 26.—T. B. Hunter, a teacher in the Adams school, twelve miles northeast of here, has been fatally stabbed by a 13-year-old pupil named Charles Ayers, whom he was whipping. The boy is in jail here.

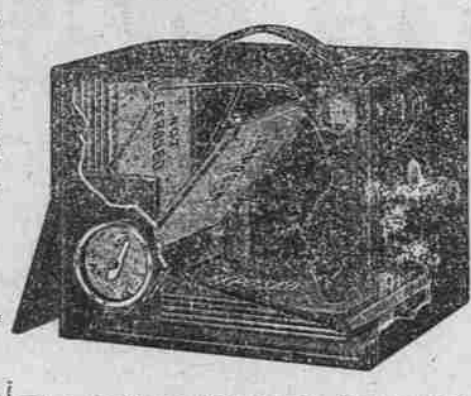
