It brings Independence and Opportunity for Engaging in Business.

"If some one should ask, 'What is to be gained by learning a trade?' the answer first suggesting itself would be to show that a skilled worker—an artisan or mechanic—earns two, three or even four times as much wages in the same number of hours or days as an unskilled laborer—one who does work that requires no special training," writes Barton Cheyne in the February Ladies' Home Journal. "The services of a skilled worker are also in more constant demand, and while he earns two or three times as much per hour, he has longer periods of work and less enforced idleness than the unskilled laborer.

The possession of a trade gives a comforting sense of security and independence, for one thus skilled is always sure of a comfortable livelihood, and with economy, a competency for the declining years of his life, and besides, he has various opportunities of engaging in profitable business for himself. These advantages are within the reach of every bright boy, and obtainable without a sacrifice. This will be understood when it is considered that the wages of an apprentice to a trade are about the same as the wages of a lad of the same age at unskilled forms of labor; consequently the apprentice is making about as much money as if employed at ordinary manual labor, besides gaining a trade."

SAWMILL WAS BURNED DOWN

Fire at Acme Entails a Loss of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars.

EUGENE, Jan. 31.—Particulars have just been received here of the burning of Cushman's sawmill at Acme, on the Sinslaw river. The mill, together with about 200,000 feet of dressed lumber, was destroyed by fire last Thursday night. A chute was used to carry the sawdust and scraps to a pit some distance from the mill, where a fire was kept to consume the waste. Thursday night the wind carried the fire to the mill, and the entire plant was soon a mass of ruins. A large part of the mill was built on piles over the river, and the machinery fell into the water as the floor burned away.

The loss is estimated at \$200,000. The mill was the largest on the river, and had a capacity of about 50,000 feet of lumber per day.

WALKED 205,920 MILES.

Remarkable Record of a Postman Who Has Just Retired.

A Mr. Roberts, for 33 years a postman of Pilling in the Fylde, North Lancashire, has just retired, reports the London Mail. For 22 years he walked from Pilling to Fleetwood and back twice a day, not to mention many perilous trips in crossing the river Wyre during periods of storm. A calculation of five miles each way, four times a day (in addition to his round at the village), six days in the week, for 22 years, shows that he walked 137,280 miles between Pilling and Fleetwood in the fulfillment of his duty. During this time he must have crossed the river Wyre (a by no means pleasant task in the winter time) 27,457 times. His duties were considerably lightened when 11 years ago the government decided to bring the mails to Pilling by another route. Though this did away with crossing the river it did not reduce the distance Postman Roberts had to walk very much. Including the village delivery, he must in his 33 years of service have walked no less than 205,920 miles.
