The Sixteenth's superb record at Santiago has become a deathless story in American history As a writer in Harper's Weekly says, "the men of the best. Phone 25. the Sixteenth regular infantry and Mchl. the colors of that regiment were first on the heights of San Juan, and this Regulator Line regiment lost more heavily in killed and wounded than any other."

In the fierce battle of Manila, the heaviest losses fell on the gallant Fourteenth from Vancouver. This regiment lost twelve killed. Next in death losses comes the splendid First regiment of Washington volunteers, with ten men killed. The Idaho volunteers come third, with five men killed, and only two-thirds of the regiment in action. Spokane's two companies of the Washington volunteers lost three men killed and twenty FREIGHT AND PASSENGER LINE

The records indisputably show that in this war the west has done the fighting for the nation. The fighting at Santingo was borne almost entirely by western men. The regulars under Shafter, both cavalry and infantry, came chiefly from western army posts, and had been recruited from western manhood. The only volunteer organization which distinguished itself in the Santiago campaign was the rough riders, and they were chiefly men of the west.

In the naval engagements of this war the preponderance of western fighters was not so great as in the army, but there, too, the west made a glorious record. Dewey's crews were gathered largely along the Pacific Letters of Credit issued available in the


