LET US ASSIST IT.

"We Are Indebted to the Boys and Girls' Aid Society, Which Needs Assistance."

It is greatly to be regretted that our legislators did not see fit to aid in a more substantial manner one of the best factors for genuine good in the state—the Boys and Girls' Aid Society, of Portland, which has for some time past been in the most straitened financial circumstances. Through this society's hands pass annually an average of 264 children gathered from all parts of the state; children who are taken from homes of degradation and want to receive the best of training from officers who are kind-hearted and in every way competent to bring a child up in the way it should go. It would be thoroughly impossible to find a better superintendent than Mr. Gardiner, who, while he demands obedience, has a manner which draws each child to him, having therefore the best of influence over them. He is also full of life and wit and is capable of attracting the sympathies of those committed to his charge in this way when others fail. Mrs. Graham, the matron, is a woman thoroughly suited to her position, giving the little waifs a motherly care not found in homes they are taken from. Wasco county has great reason to feel

deeply indebted to this society, which has taken numbers of homeless, uncared for boys and girls from her midst and placed them in the best of Oregon homes. Our people should therefore take a deep interest in the welfare of this institution, aiding it individually when ever practicable.

Just at present is a good time in which to look into this matter and see what can be done, as from an estimate carefully made by the superintendent, there is needed for the coming two years, \$11,554, and the income to be depended upon is only \$3954, leaving a deficit of \$7569. Therefore, if no other aid is received, it will be impossible for this good work to continue.

Dawson as She Is.

A letter received by a gentleman in this city from a friend who was formerly a resident of Cascade Locks, but is now at Dawson City, has the following concerning that place, from which we have heard such a diversity of reports:

"I will just say that this country is very much over-rated, both in regard to its mineral wealth and also the terrible cold weather so much feared by newcomers. With the exception of warm mitts and moccasins I have worn the same kind of clothes that I did at the Locks and suffered no more with the cold here than there, although it has been fifty-eight below already, and that is about as cold as it gets at any time during the winter.

"I staked what has proven to be a valuable claim on the first of September, but as I did not give up a half-interest to any one in connection with the official ring, I, as well as hundreds of other Americans, could not get it recorded. To place it in as mild a form as possible, I will say that I never knew anything in ward politics one-half as corrupt as the official transactions of the N. W. T. for the past seven months. I will try the American side in the spring, where the one man power is not known.

NEW BATTLE-SHIP MAINE

Work On Her Has Been Begun at the Cramp Shipyards.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 15.—The anniversary of the blowing up of the battleship Maine in Havana harbor was marked here with the beginning of work on the powerful man-of-war which will bear the name of the historic battleship that was destroyed. The new Maine will be built by the Cramps Shipbuilding Company, and at the company's yards at 11 o'clock today the first piece of the keel of the vessel was laid. There was no formality in the proceedings, but the shipyard was thrown open to the public, and a great cheer was given by the crowd as the group of workmen set in place the first steel piece of the keel. The builders will endeavor to have the new battleship ready for launching February 15th, next year, and to have her ready for service on the third anniversary of the sinking of the Maine.
