FAURE BURIED YESTERDAY Remains of the Late President of France Laid to Rest in the Cemetery of

Pere la Chaise.

PARIS, Feb. 23 .- The remains of President Faure were laid to rest in the cemetery of Pere la Chaise with military honors. President Loubet, army and government officials, members of all foreign missions, the papal nuncio and other distinguished persons took part in the procession to Notre Dame cathedral, where the ceremonies took place.

The streets along the route to the church were lined with soldiers, back of whom surged many thousand spectators. At times there were shouts of "Vive la armee," but nothing was eaid to Loubet,

At the conclusion of the ceremonies at the cathedral, the procession, with the remains, proceeded to the cemetery. The whole way was traversed without unpleasant incident. The military and police arrangements were admirable.

It Furnishes a Very Remarkable II-Justration of Probable Telepathle Perception.

I can youch for the truth of the following interesting case of elairvey-ance, says a London Mail writer: On August 12 a young man named Livie Cibrario, belonging to one of the most ancient families of Turin, while attempting to climb the peak of Rocciamelone, in the Maritime Alps, lost his way, and on the following morning a search party found his body, terribly crushed and bruised, at the bottom of a deep crevasse.

Count Cibrario, the unfortunate young man's father, who was at Turin and knew nothing of his son's expedition to the Roccinmelone, on the night of the accident aroused the rest of the family, announcing with tears that Livio was dead. He had seen him distinctly, he said, blood flowing from his battered head, and had heard these words spoken in a voice of terrible anguish:

"Father, I slipped down a precipice and broke my head, and I am dead, quite dead."

The other members of the family tried in vain to persuade the poor count that the ghastly vision was nothing but a nightmare, and the bereaved father continued in a state of anxiety bordering upon distraction till the morning when the official confirmation of the terrible accident reached him.

This case of telegraphy, or whatever name may be given to similar phenom ena, is considered all the more remarka able, as Count Cibrario is a very quiet. matter-of-fact person, and has never suffered from disorders of the nervous system or dabbled in spiritualism.

## ODDITIES OF DIET.

Different Articles of Food Considered Edible by the People of Various Nations.

Among the various nations there have been great differences as to articles considered edible, and, of course, among such as could be procured. The Tar-

tars, Marco Polo says, ate horses, camels, dogs and drank mares' milk. The Scythians also, according to Herodotus, drank mares' milk. In China birds nests, rats and snails are eaten. The edible birds' nests are found in the Nico bars, a cluster of islands in the Bay of Pengal. These nests, built by the Nicobar swallows, form one of the princi-I al exports of the islands. The Greenlanders depend largely on seals. The ancient Germans, according to Tacitus. ate wild apples, flesh and cheese. In Abyssinia the natives cut steak from the live cow, according to Bruce, and ate the meat warm with the natural

heat. says Lippincott's. Among the Egyptians near Elephantine the crocodile was an article of food The Egyptians thought wheat and barley poor food; they ate principally spelt and zea. The priests ate beef, geese, and took wine, but not fish. The Egyptians did not eat beans or raise them. They did not eat the head of any creature. They ate honey and raisins. Among them no cattle were killed except for sacrifice. They ate sheep and goats, and swine's flesh only when offered to Bucchus and Luna. They had no vines, but made a liquor from barley. They ate fish fresh and salted, or dried in the sun; also quail and ducks.

Gentlemen :-- So many inquiries are coming to the office relative to the school laws made by the legislative as-sembly, that I have deemed it best to answer a few by a circular letter until I shall have the laws printed for general distribution, which will be done in a few dave.

1. Qualifications for voters at school meetings and for school officers remain as prescribed at the special session.

2. There is no emergency clause to the "Daly Educational Bill."

3. There is an emergency clause to the "Reed Bill" which allows a school district to retain the amount on hand at, the annual school meeting up to and including fifty dollars.

There is no change in the time of the annual school meeting. Respectfully yours,
