THE MILES INQUIRY.

Miles is building a strong case before the military court of inquiry. More light is shed there in an hour than was developed in a week before the so-called war investigating commission, says the Spokesman-Review.

The testimony of army officers thus far has been that the canned beef was a vile ration—tasteless, stringy, deprived of nutriment, and nauseating. Little doubt remains that it was the worthless pulp remaining after the nutriment had been extracted for sale as beef extract.

If beef contractors committed that Spanish deed, they should be hanged, because the crime would be nothing less than cold blooded murder. They well knew that the troops were destined to follow the flag into places of great danger and tremendous exertion. That it was a matter of life and death to supply them with nutritious food. They must have known that their stringy pulp would be poison to a system enfeebled by fever and the exertions of warfare.

If it shall be clearly proved that contractors extracted the nutrition from beef and sold the offal to the government, to be fed to our soldiers, words will fail to express the indignant and righteous anger of the nation.

This point is vastly more important than the question whether fresh beef was chemically treated. If beef were treated with chemicals, the purpose was to preserve it longer, and while the experiment was dangerous, it would be a matter of wrong judgment and not a deliberate attempt to plunder the government and kill its defenders.

This inquiry proved the need of a complete investigation of the entire conduct of the war. The recent investigation was a mere pretense. Its true character is known at home and suspected abroad. No one respects it, or believes its findings.

Some of the American Malays are now shouting gleefully that "the war in the Philippines may last for years." This means that they suppose their friends in the islands will be followed into the swamps and hills of the interior by the Americans, and that they can dodge punishment better than they did around Manila, where they had to fight or abandon their position for good.

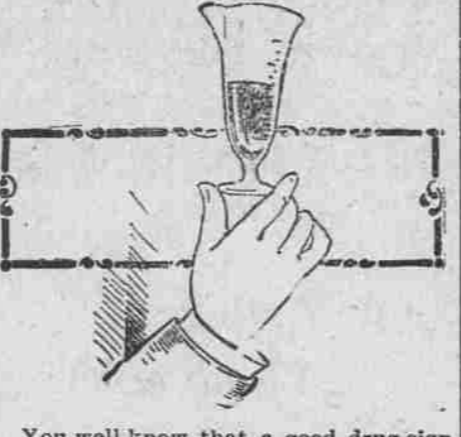

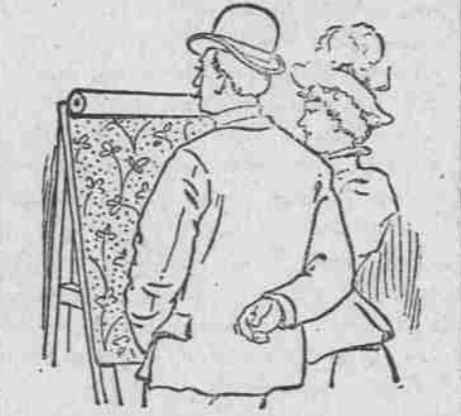
