Portland, Ore., March 21, 1899. Hon. Geo. C. Blakeley, President Commercial Club, The Dalles, Oregon.

Dear Sir and Friend:—With pleasure I read yours of even date regarding the action of the Commercial Club in the matter of entertaining the National Editorial Association delegates.

Having attended the association about a dozen times, leads me to agree with the opinion expressed by the directors, that a trip down the grand Columbia after a dusty ride from Spokane would be the proper move.

It is expected that the delegates arrive here not earlier than the morning of July 4. That matter rests with Mr. Page. He could so arrange that the special arrive at the metropolis of Wasco county about 9 a. m., the 31, spend two hours in your city, then board the steamer for this city, arriving in time for them to aid us in ushering in the 4th.

The delegates will be governed by Mr. Page's suggestions, and the sooner all of our plans are laid before him the better for all concerned. The Dalles will be recognized on this program.

A committee will meet the delegates at the state line. Another could meet them at The Dalles. By making the river trip on the way here would save a day that could be devoted to some other point. Perhaps that day could be spent at Vancouver.

To whom it may concern: By virtue of an order, made by the Common Council of Dalles City, Oregon, on the 7th day of March, A. D. 1899, notice is hereby given that the Common Council aforesaid will cause to be constructed in accordance with the laws pertaining thereto, a sewer system in and for said city; the nature, extent and location of said system is hereinafter set forth; and the cost thereon will be charged to the property benefited thereby.

That all of said sewers are to be of terra cotta pipe and of such sizes as may be hereafter determined by said Council.

First—A main sewer, commencing from the low water mark on the Columbia river at the foot of Union street, thence running south on Union street to the intersection of the alley between Fourth and Fifth streets with Union street, thence south on Union street to the intersection of Tenth and Union streets.

Second—A main sewer, commencing at and connected with the sewer at the intersection of the alley between Fourth and Fifth streets with Union street, thence running easterly, through private property in block 10, thence easterly through the alley between Fourth and Fifth streets to Washington street, thence south on Washington street to Fifth street.

Third—A sewer commencing at and connected with the sewer at the intersection of the alley between First and Second streets with Union street, thence running easterly through said alley to Jefferson street, thence north on Jefferson street to the intersection of Third and Fourth streets, thence south on Laughlin street to Fourth street.

Fourth—A sewer commencing at and connected with the sewer at the intersection of the alley between First and Second streets with Union street, thence running easterly through said alley to Jefferson street, thence north on Jefferson street about 100 feet, thence easterly to a point in the middle of Taylor street about 130 feet north of the north side of the intersection of Taylor and Second streets.

Fifth—A sewer commencing at the intersection of the alley between Second and Third streets with Taylor street, thence westerly on said alley to Monroe street, thence north to connect with sewer in alley between First and Second streets.

Tenth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Laughlin street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with Laughlin street, thence westerly to Washington street.

Eleventh—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Second and Third streets with Union street, thence running easterly along said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Twelfth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with Union street, thence running easterly along said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Thirteenth—A sewer commencing at and connected with the sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with Union street, thence easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Fourteenth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Fifth and Sixth streets with Union street, thence easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Fifteenth—A sewer commencing at and connected with the sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley north of First street with said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Sixteenth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Second and Third streets with Union street, thence westerly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Liberty street, thence southerly on Liberty street to the alley between Fifth and Sixth streets.

Seventeenth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Liberty street at the intersection of the alley between Second and Third streets with Union street, thence westerly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Liberty street.

Eighteenth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets, thence running westerly through said alley to the west end of said alley.

Nineteenth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets, thence running westerly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Liberty street.

Twentieth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Liberty street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with said Liberty street, thence running easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Union street.

Twenty-first—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Liberty street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with said Liberty street, thence running easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Lincoln street.

Twenty-second—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Liberty street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with said Liberty street, thence running easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Lincoln street.

Twenty-third—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer at the intersection of Third and Pentland streets, thence running easterly on Third street to the intersection of Third and Pentland streets.

Twenty-fourth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer at the intersection of Third and Pentland streets, thence running easterly on Third street to the intersection of Third and Pentland streets.

Twenty-fifth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Third street at the intersection of Third and Fourth streets, thence running westerly and 75 feet more or less north of the road leading to the Mill creek bridge, to said Mill creek bridge.
