PUGET SOUND FOGS.

The Queer Sights Which Are Seen When Atmospheric Conditions Are Favorable.

Seafaring men have often described meeting with a fog bank at sea the limits of which were so clearly defined that the forward part of their vessel would be in bright sunlight, with the after portion enveloped in dense fog.

That the phenomenon is not mistated, any of the many people passing the brink of the decline leading down Pacific avenue from the city hall at ten o'clock Saturday morning could readily attest.

Suddenly there came from the straits a bank of fog, which, instead of unfolding and drifting over the surface of the bay came solidly on. This formation was kept up until the fog struck the rise on Pacific avenue leading from the wharf.

The spectacle of the on-marching wall of fog, as clearly perpendicular as the side of a building, with the sun's rays striking against it, was indeed grand. Several shipping men noticed it, and fog was made the subject of conversation in a number of offices on the water front, bringing forth the narration of similar instances.

One of these came from Capt. McCabe, who said: "The strangest combination for fog to take on that has come under my observation occurred here on the sound some months ago.

"I was traveling by steamer from Port Townsend to Seattle. As we rounded Admiralty Head there loomed up before us what appeared to be a water-logged steamer. From her bulwark rails up everything was perfectly visible.

"But below the bulwark line nothing could be seen of the vessel. She might have been some Puget sound 'Flying Dutchman' for all we knew, or possibly a craft that had come in collision and was seeking a beaching point before sinking.

"It was weird and for several moments deceiving. The morning had opened so thick that the fog had driven down so close to the surface of the channel as to form a blanket for but the lower part of a vessel. We came near enough to hail, and were informed that the steamer was doing finely.

"The fog failing to rise, everything was lovely."—Tacoma Ledger.

Twenty-fifth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Third street at the intersection of Third and Fourth streets, thence running westerly and 75 feet more or less north of the road leading to the Mill creek bridge, to said Mill creek bridge.

To whom it may concern: By virtue of an order, made by the Common Council of Dalles City, Oregon, on the 7th day of March, A. D. 1899, notice is hereby given that the Common Council aforesaid will cause to be constructed, in accordance with the laws pertaining thereto, a sewer system in and for said city.

That all of said sewers are to be of terra cotta pipe and of such sizes as may be hereafter determined by said Council.

First—A main sewer, commencing from the low water mark on the Columbia river at the foot of Union street, thence running south on Union street to the intersection of the alley between Fourth and Fifth streets with Union street, thence south on Union street to the intersection of Tenth and Union streets.

Second—A main sewer, commencing at and connected with the sewer at the intersection of the alley between Fourth and Fifth streets with Union street, thence running easterly, through private property in block 30, thence easterly through the alley between Fourth and Fifth streets to Washington street, thence south on Washington street to Fulton street.

Third—A sewer commencing at and connected with the sewer at the intersection of the alley between First and Second streets with Laughlin street, thence running easterly through said alley to Jefferson street, thence north on Jefferson street about 100 feet, thence easterly to a point in the middle of Taylor street about 100 feet north of the north side of the intersection of Taylor and Second streets.

Fourth—A sewer commencing at and connected with the sewer at the intersection of the alley between Second and Third streets with Taylor street, thence westerly on said alley to Monroe street, thence north to connect with sewer in alley between First and Second streets.

Fifth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Laughlin street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with Laughlin street, thence running easterly to Madison street, thence easterly on Third street to the intersection of Third and Monroe streets.

Sixth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Laughlin street at the intersection of the alley between Second and Third streets with Laughlin street, thence running easterly to Madison street, thence easterly on Third street to the intersection of Third and Monroe streets.

Seventh—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Laughlin street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with Laughlin street, thence running easterly to Madison street.

Eighth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Laughlin street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with said Union street, thence easterly along said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Ninth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with said Union street, thence easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Tenth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with said Union street, thence easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Eleventh—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with said Union street, thence easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Twelfth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with said Union street, thence easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Thirteenth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with said Union street, thence easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Fourteenth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with said Union street, thence easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Fifteenth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with said Union street, thence easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

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
