An Attack on the City of 25,000 Inhabitants to be Made.

# AMERICANS MEET NO OPPOSITION

Rebels Making Efforts to Reinforce the following dispatch: Their Garrisons at Bulacan and Ginganto-Intense Heat Made the Advance Difficult.

Manila, March 28 .- 11 a.m.-General MacArthur's division advanced nearly two miles without encountering opposition this morning. On approaching Bulacan, a town of 25,000 people, it halted, Of Treating Dyspepsia and Indigestion preparatory to attacking it.
