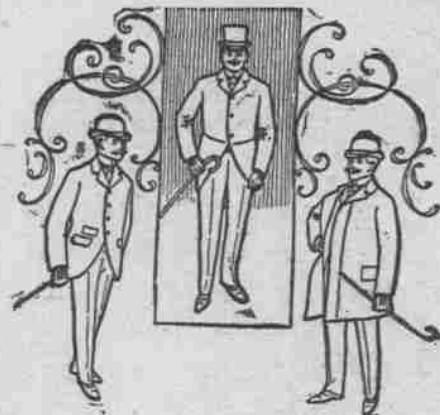

The family of Rev. D. V. Foling is today engaged in moving into the residence formerly occupied by Hugh Gourlay on Sixth street. Mr. Gourlay is building a

neat little cottage adjoining, into which his family will move when it is finished.

Otis Patterson left on the afternoon train for Portland to attend the annual "Myetic Banquet" to be given by the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite Masons in that city tonight at 9 o'clock. This is always a great event among the members of this order.

During these uncertain times of the war and the anxiety felt by relatives of the soldier boys, many cablegrams would be sent to the scene of action were it not for the expense thus incurred. It is said that every word sent to Manila costs \$2.47. One young man well known in The Dalles, sent a cablegram from Manila to his mother in New York which cost \$32.

A meeting of the teachers of the public school will be held at 4 o'clock today, when arrangements will be made for their trip to Dufur Saturday. Conveyances have been engaged and will leave here at 8 o'clock. The ladies of Dufur will serve lunch at the school house upon their arrival, and in the afternoon the program will be carried out. Anyone interested in the educational meeting, and who may desire to go, may do so by informing Supt. Gilbert tomorrow.

The Portland Rolling Mills Company has purchased the wreck of the ship Glenmorag, which has lain high and dry on the shore at Long Beach, Wash., since March, '96. Sojourners at that point this summer will therefore be entertained with the sight of the gradual demolition of the big hulk, which will be taken apart and sent to Portland, to be melted and rolled into the strap iron of commerce. The purchase was made from the last party who tried to float the vessel.

The Salem Statesman says: "The early closing movement will be inaugurated among Salem's business houses Monday next. The movement includes the dry goods, shoe and clothing establishments of the city, and, commencing Monday, they will close every day, Saturday excepted, at 6 p. m. All of the business men representing the above departments have acquiesced in the agreement, which includes Sunday closing also." When will The Dalles follow suit? At least let the business houses begin its consideration.

It is reported by people arriving in Baker City from the west that along the railroad from as far as The Dalles there is a vast number of men making their way to Huntington, or rather to the scene of construction operations on the line of the Northwest Railway, expecting to get work. Some are beating their way on the O. R. & N. while others are tramping it, with camping outfit and bedding on their backs. At Meacham Sunday, there were a hundred or more, with here and there a genuine hobo sandwiched in. The Northwest Railway company has advertised for 1,000 laborers and at the rate they are coming the ranks will soon be filled.—Baker City Democrat.

Another evidence of the artistic taste of Ernest Jensen is given in the arrangement of the Easter window at A. M. Williams' store. At one end of the window he has placed an old fashioned tomb made of white bunting with purple trimming. The gates are ajar and inside may be seen a large Easter egg drawn by six beautiful white doves and driven by an angel, who holds the silken reins. In the mouth of one of the doves is a green spray, betokening the coming of spring. The sky is studded with stars, while the remainder of the window is draped in dainty summer goods. It is a clever device representing the opening of spring, and is also very pretty to the view.

Much distress has been caused among the relatives of the boys now facing the bullets at Manila on account of the uncertainty of the names given in the list of the dead and wounded, and the mistakes made in the names of the companies. No doubt when dispatches are received and comment is afterward given in the Portland papers, they depend somewhat on the official roster for information, and seeing the same names in various regiments, often get the names confused in that manner. Among the list of the dead given in Monday's Oregonian was William W. Cook, of Company L. In the notes below, the initials were given as William E. Among The Dalles boys who enlisted was William E. Cook, son of Dr. Cook, who lives some distance in the country, and grandson of Mrs. Kerrison. What more natural than that the latter should think it her boy who was killed, and the thought almost prostrated her, until yesterday's Oregonian gave the assurance that it was William M. Cook, of Junction City, a private in Company D. The suspense in such cases often causes more pain than the certainty, and we are glad for the sake of his relatives that their fears were unfounded.

LET THEM SEE THE ENTIRE CITY

The Editors Must See Something Beside the View on First Street.

The committee on arrangements for the entertainment of the National Editorial Association, which met Tuesday night in Portland, recommended to the secretary of the association that the excursion reach The Dalles on the morning of July 3rd and make the trip down the river to Portland by boat.

It is very likely that Secretary Page will act on the recommendation given, and report at once. As soon as word is received from him, the committee in The Dalles will immediately arrange for their entertainment. As they will probably remain here two hours at least, it is thought best to provide breakfast for them, and at the same time see that they have an opportunity to view the city beyond the limits of First street. Fatal would be the result to our town were they compelled to gaze on the beauty of that street alone, with its massive buildings, well-kept lawns, and the boulevards leading in every direction. True, it would be a rare privilege to obtain a view of China as here represented, or to gaze upon the awful grandeur of the ruins on the river bank, comprising all there is left of the once famous can of salmon; bottles which in their palmy days contained some of the most healing balm; rare bits of china; valuable documents—in fact, curios of all kinds. But at the same time to give them a comprehensive idea of the city, they should be taken to some of the benches in the background.

To this end it has been suggested that the residents be called upon to lend their assistance by turning out with their horses and buggies, carriages, carts, hacks, wheelbarrows, etc., and by so doing every visitor can be driven through the city and to the hills beyond, where the best view of the mountains and river can be obtained. Such was the plan adopted by the people of Loveland, Colo., and one which made a lasting impression on their guests.

### Death of Miss Nellie Hudson.

Two gentlemen who arrived in the city from Nansene about noon, brought news of the death of Miss Nellie Hudson, daughter of Henry Hudson, at that place this morning. About ten days ago she was taken very ill with a severe case of grippe, which caused heart trouble, and ended in her death.

Miss Hudson's death will be greatly deplored by the entire community near her home, as well as in the districts where she has taught. For several years she has been a teacher in the schools of the county and was to begin a term of school in Dist. No. 28 next Monday. The fact that she has taught a number of terms successfully in her home district, No. 30, is proof of her competency, as the home school is usually the most difficult to manage.
