The secretary of the interior has approved a patent of 6761 acres of land in The Dalles land district, to be used for school purposes.

Be a Little Cautious.

For the benefit of any Dalles young people who may indulge in the pastime of holding hands, we publish the following, contained in a Philadelphia dispatch, which may prevent any serious results in our city: It says:

"Miss Edith Boone, of this city, has begun a suit for \$15,000 damages against Frederick R. Farrow, a young drug clerk, for squeezing her hands so violently that the small bones in one of them were broken and both hands were rendered practically useless. Her doctor says necrosis may necessitate the amputation of one hand.

"The squeezing was done a year ago, when Farrow had a situation in the store under where Miss Boone's family lived, and where he took his meals. Of the singular case the fair plaintiff said: 'Just after dinner, March 18, 1898, Fred seized both my hands and jokingly began to squeeze them. It hurt terribly, and I asked him to let go, but he would not. He pressed my hands very hard for five minutes. I cried and begged him to stop. A few hours afterward my right wrist swelled awfully and turned purple. I was treated at the polytechnic hospital, but both of my hands are useless, as you see. They are getting worse too.'

"I was only in fun," said Farrow in explanation. "My case is in the hands of a lawyer."

Glove-Making Animals.

Among the more popular materials used in modern glove-making are kid, lamb, buck, doe and dog skins. The kids are specially reared for the use of their hides. They are all kept in pens, and thus are prevented from injuring their skins against hedges, palings or rocks. They are fed only with milk, so as to preserve the quality of the hide, which becomes very delicate, and, naturally, more valuable. At one time Senator Mackay, of Nevada, conceived the idea of buying up all the goats in the world, so as to obtain a monopoly of kid leather, but the scheme did not flourish. Following closely upon this was a plan projected by several French capitalists to catch all the rats in Chicago and establish a preserve which would supply the French glove-makers with rat skins to be converted into "kid" gloves.—Frank H. "Tonnage" and "Displacement."

At the present time, when naval matters are a source of great interest to the general public, one continually finds the terms "displacement" and "tonnage" improperly used, both in the daily press and in common speech. The confusion between the terms would not occur if their meaning were understood. "Displacement" refers to the quantity of liquid displaced by the immersed hull of the ship, and "tonnage" to the freight-carrying capacity of the ship determined by certain rules of measurement.

The displacement of a vessel is the entire weight of the hull with all its contents, according to the well-known law of hydrostatics that a floating body displaces a weight of fluid just equal to its own weight. A ship sinks in the water to such level that the pressure of the fluid displaced exactly counterbalances the weight of the ship.—Engineering News.

To whom it may concern: By virtue of an order, made by the Common Council of Dalles, Oregon, on the 7th day of March, A. D. 1898, notice is hereby given that the Common Council aforesaid will cause to be constructed in accordance with the laws pertaining thereto, a sewer system in and for said city; the nature, extent and location of said system is hereinafter set forth; and the cost thereof will be charged to the property benefited thereby.

That all of said sewers are to be of terra cotta pipe and of such sizes as may be hereafter determined by said Council.

First—A main sewer, commencing from the low water mark on the Columbia river at the foot of Union street, thence running south on Union street to the intersection of the alley between Fourth and Fifth streets, thence south on Union street to the intersection of Tenth and Union streets.

Second—A main sewer, commencing at and connected with the sewer at the intersection of the alley between Fourth and Fifth streets with Union street, thence running easterly, through private property in block 10, thence easterly through the alley between Fourth and Fifth streets to Washington street, thence south on Washington street to Fulton street.

Third—A sewer commencing at and connected with the sewer at the intersection of the alley between First and Second streets with Union street, thence running south on Union street to Laughlin street, thence south on Laughlin street to Fourth street.

Fourth—A sewer commencing at and connected with the sewer at the intersection of the alley between First and Second streets with Union street, thence running easterly through said alley to Jefferson street, thence north on Jefferson street about 100 feet, thence easterly to a point in the middle of Taylor street about 130 feet north of the north side of the intersection of Taylor and Second streets.

Fifth—A sewer commencing at the intersection of the alley between Second and Third streets with Taylor street, thence westerly on said alley to Monroe street, thence north to connect with sewer in alley between First and Second streets.

Eleventh—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Second and Third streets with Laughlin street, thence easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Twelfth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Second and Third streets with Union street, thence running easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Thirteenth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Third and Fourth streets with Union street, thence easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Fourteenth—A sewer commencing at and connected with the sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley between Fifth and Sixth streets with Union street, thence easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.

Fifteenth—A sewer commencing at and connected with sewer on Union street at the intersection of the alley north of First street with Union street, thence running easterly through said alley to the intersection of said alley with Washington street.
