First a shaft was sunk 70 feet into the ground and then a scaffolding was crected over the shaft, to render the andling of the great thermometer easy. The scaffolding was higher than the thermometer, which had to be hoisted to the perpendicular by means of steam cranes and then dropped gently into the 70-foot shaft.

When it is in place this unique ther-mometer will register the temperature of mother earth 70 feet below the surface, recording exactly all her moods, and giving scientists an opportunity to become more closely acquainted with the underground mysteries of the globe on which we live.






