**INTERESTING TO TEACHERS**

Who Wish to Attend the National Educational Association. SALEM, Ore., May 20.—To Oregon Teachers: The National Education Association will convene at Los Angeles, July 11 to 14, 1899. As it will be some time before we can hope to secure this great convention on the coast again, this meeting affords us an excellent opportunity to come in touch with the men and women who are moulding and shaping, to a great extent, the educational sentiment and practices of the country. One who has never attended a session of the National Educational Association can scarcely realize the enthusiasm and inspiration for the teaching profession that may be secured by coming in contact with the personality of the eminent educators of whom this body is composed. It is an opportunity we ought not to miss; if we can possibly afford it. It is sincerely hoped that many of you can see your way clear to attend, and show, by your presence, that Oregon teachers are not behind the times. Hotel accommodations may be had at the following rates: Hotel Westminster, the executive committee's headquarters, European plan, \$1 to \$4. American plan, \$2.50 to \$6; Van Noy's, European plan, \$1 to \$4, American plan, \$2.50 to \$6; Rosslyn, one block from the Westminster, European plan, \$1, American, \$2.50; Hollenbeck, European plan, \$1 and up, American, \$2.50 and up; Nadeau, the same; Hotel Broadway, European plan, 50 cents, American plan, \$1 and up; Hotel Catalina, European \$1, American \$2; Hotel Baltimore, European, 75 cents to \$1.50. This list might be made longer, but the above are sufficient to give one an idea of what it will cost to live after reaching the convention city. All the above hotels give special rates by the week or month. All are centrally located. Within a radius of two blocks from the Westminster hotel over fifteen hundred good rooms can be obtained. The earliest applicants will, of course, secure the most satisfactory accommodations. The several transportation companies offer the following very liberal rates: Southern Pacific—A \$35 round trip rate, Portland to Los Angeles and return, exclusive of sleeping car privileges,
