Trusts Are Organized at Expense of Consumer.

WILL BE THE BIG ISSUE

In the Presidential Campaign to Come Next Year—Republicans Investigating

SAN FRANCISCO, June 22.—Henry T. Oxnard, president of the American Beet Sugar Producers' Association, has prepared a reply to H. O. Havemeyer's recent argument before the industrial commission at Washington. He flatly denies many of Mr. Havemeyer's statements, and accuses that gentleman of seeking to destroy the American beet-sugar industry in order to foster the refineries that handle foreign raw material, besides attempting to divert public attention from the sugar trust by attacking the tariff. In his statement given in the Morning Call, Mr. Oxnard says:

"The two largest, in fact, the pioneer trusts in the country as every one knows, are the Standard Oil and Sugar trusts. The Standard Oil Company does not enjoy its monopoly from the tariff and the American Sugar Refining Company, according to Mr. Havemeyer, receives only 3 1/2 per cent protection. How absurd, then, is it to say that the tariff is responsible for trusts. But right here, I wish to dispute Mr. Havemeyer's statement regarding the protection afforded to sugar refining, claiming that it only receives a protection of 3 1/2 per cent.

"In the Dingley tariff act sugar refining receives a protection of an eighth of a cent per pound and the testimony produced before the ways and means committee, of which Mr. Dingley was chairman, brought out the fact that sugar in a modern refinery, with the best machinery, well located, can be refined at a cost of about a quarter of a cent per pound. We therefore find that sugar refining under these conditions is receiving a protection of not 3 1/2, but 50 per cent ad valorem, based on the cost of refining sugar. The protection granted the sugar-producers who make the article of sugar itself, is 50 per cent on the cost of raw sugar today, or identical with the protection granted the sugar-refining companies."

Mr. Oxnard declares that American sugar-producers would suffer and the development of the beet-sugar industry be retarded by the admission of raw sugar free of duty. He adds:

"There is no trust among the sugar-producers of this country and there never can be, for the simple reason that the beet-sugar industry can be started in almost any part of the Union."

Deep Water at Columbia's Mouth.

ASTORIA, June 21.—The channel of the Columbia, or, as it is generally called, "the bar," is rapidly shifting its position, due undoubtedly to the effect of the jetty. There is now almost as much water in the old north channel as in the present channel marked out by the buoys. Yesterday Pilot Matthews went out on the tug Wallula and made soundings around the mouth of the river. He headed about northwest between buoys No. 1 and 1 1/2, nearly in the line with the old north channel. He found in it no less than twenty-five feet of water, and that only at few places, clear out to deep water. Captain Matthews says that, while the channel is undoubtedly shifting to the north and Peacock spit is disappearing, there is as much water as there ever was, and though some sand is piled up by a westerly wind, it soon washes clear again. Fully realizing the benefit that the jetty has been to the bar, he feels confident that its extension a mile farther out would increase its use-

Forms a New Cabinet for France.

PARIS, June 22.—Senator Waldeck Rousseau was recalled to Elysee palace this morning, where President Loubet requested that he form a cabinet immediately. Later it was announced that he had reported successful progress and hoped to be able to complete the cabinet this afternoon.

PARIS, June 22.—Late this afternoon the announcement was made that Senator Waldeck Rousseau had completed the formation of a cabinet. The senator, accompanied by the cabinet ministers, proceeded to Elysee palace at 8:10 p. m., to present his colleagues to President Loubet. The new cabinet, as organized, follows: Senator Waldeck Rousseau, president of the council of ministers and minister of interior; M. Delcasse, minister of foreign affairs; General Marquis de Gallest, war; M. Delanessan, marine; M. Monis, justice; M. Callaux, finance; M. Millerand, commerce; M. Leygues, public instruction; M. de Crais, colonies; M. Jean Dupuy, agriculture; M. Pierre D'Audin, public works.

MORE FALSE ARMY RUMORS

Story That Miles Will Succeed Otis at Manila is Denied.

TALK ABOUT ALGER'S GOING

General Wheeler Will Go to the Philippines—Alger Gave Indirect Confirmation of the Report.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—A denial is made at the war department that General Miles is to succeed General Otis in command in the Philippines. This was hardly necessary, as it is not likely that the war department will ever do anything for General Miles as long as Alger and Corbin are managing affairs. The rumor is again revived that Horace Porter will succeed Alger as secretary of war, and that Whitelaw Reid will be sent to Paris. This is another unlikely story, and is evidently put out by those who desire to see such a result brought about. Reid's recent and continuous criticism of the administration is not likely to result in any appointment for him, and the president will find great difficulty in getting Alger out, if Alger determines to stay.

Will Be Sent to Manila.

CHICAGO, June 21.—A special to the Times-Herald from Fotosky, Mich., says: Secretary of War Alger gave indirect confirmation today to the report that General Joseph Wheeler is to be assigned to duty in the Philippines. When questioned about it as he and General Wheeler were about to leave for the Grand Army camp fire, he replied promptly: "There is nothing to say—at least not till I issue the order." The accent, however, was unmistakable on the words "the order."

"I am still in the service," said General Wheeler, when questioned, "and am subject to orders. I am not now under orders—how soon I will be is for Secretary Alger to decide."
