THE LATEST ROUND ROBIN.

It is said that the authorities at Washington are disposed to ignore the "round robin" of the Manila correspondents, but it cannot be doubted that they were considerably shaken up by it. There is reason to believe that the statement made by the newspaper men was true in some respects, but it is not likely that a great deal of importance will be attached to their complaints.

The traveling correspondent, especially if he is attached to a journal of the yellow or sensational variety, has gotten the notion into his head that he is about the most important individual on the face of the earth. What he doesn't know isn't worth knowing, more especially if it relates to military affairs. He is under the impression that he is paid to furnish his paper with stories that will carry a "scare" head and it doesn't much matter whether they are based on facts or on fiction.

If he is thwarted in his efforts to gather news he naturally feels hurt. A good deal of criticism of officers during the late war grew out of the spite of correspondents to whom those officers did not accord the privilege the correspondents thought they were entitled to. Censorship is a military necessity, and if it has been exercised at Manila it has probably been with the best intentions. Some facts may have been suppressed which should have been made public, but after all it is probable that the people here will prefer to trust the Philippine campaign to Otis, McArthur, Lawton and Wheaton rather than to the newspaper correspondents.—Spokesman-Review.

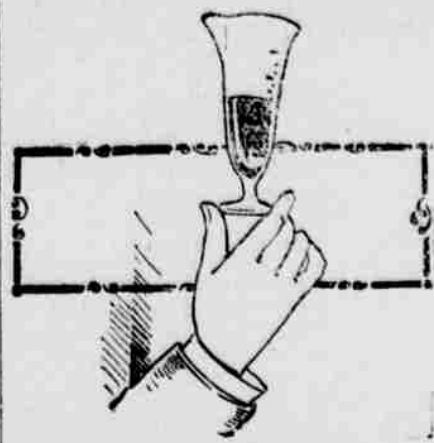

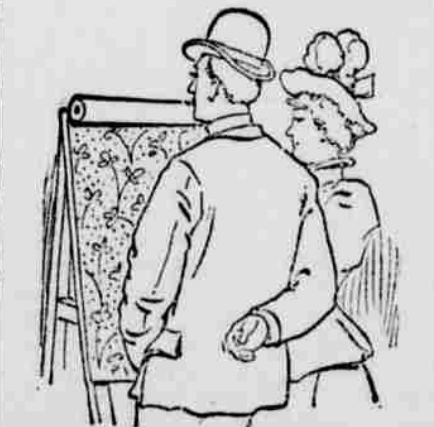

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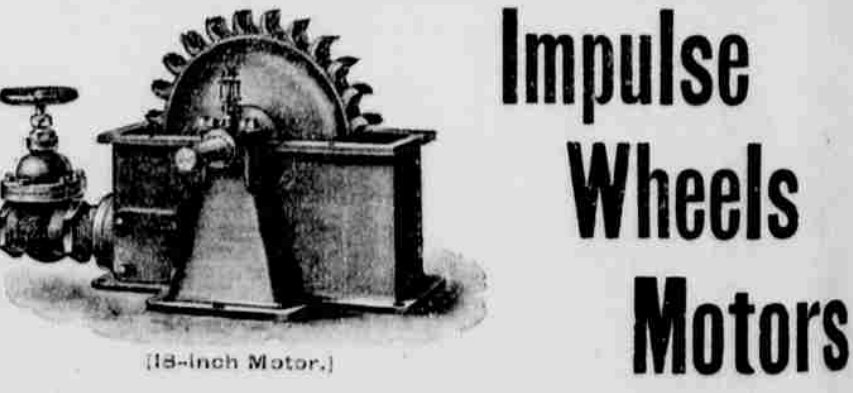
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
