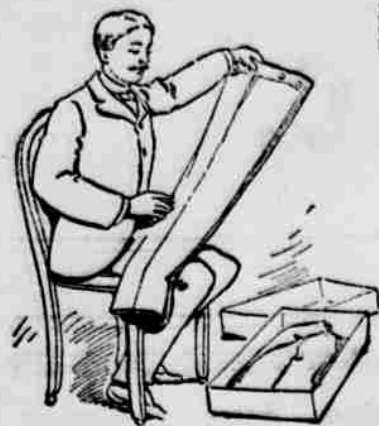

STRANGE THINGS.

Colonel Dick, the chairman of the Republican state committee of Ohio, is evidently hoping for a great deal from Governor Roosevelt's coming visit to Ohio to participate in the Republican state campaign. He has interviewed himself to say he expects Roosevelt to be the Republican candidate for president in 1904, adding that an unnamed friend of his who has traveled in the West has told him that Roosevelt is the most popular man in the country excepting the president. After such a nice indorsement for a presidential term that is still five years in the distance, what can Governor Roosevelt do but tell the Ohio Republicans that he is for McKinley, and that they ought to carry the state this fall as a send-off to his re-nomination and re-election next year. It is very evident that Colonel Dick is offering future presidential honors to Roosevelt in exchange for present help to carry Ohio in McKinley's interest.—Philadelphia Times.

Colonel Dick is not promising the impossible; and his friend has told him the truth about the sentiment in the West. The offer, tact, or explicit, is by no means impossible of fulfillment. Stranger things have happened. It took President McKinley more than five years to realize on some of the promises of support for the presidency. He was a prominent candidate for the nomination in the Republican national convention at Chicago, eight years before his successful run of 1896, at St. Louis—and at the former date ex-Governor Z. F. Moody, of Oregon, who was a delegate, cast his vote from first to last for Ohio's favorite son. It is not often, in fact, that presidential candidates are jumped up on short notice. Presidential timber needs to be seasoned. And there's a mighty good stick of it, sound and straight and without a flaw, in the gubernatorial chair of the Empire state. Indeed there is.—Salem Statesman.

ITS EFFECTS.

Secretary Tozier of the Oregon Press Association, says regarding the meeting of the national association here:

"The real value of the Portland meeting to the state of Oregon will never be known, but that great good will result all will admit. As an illustration as to the value of such a meeting in the way of advertising I will state that after Portland was selected for the 1899 meeting I began saving all press clippings that I could secure if the article referred to the 1899 meeting of the N. E. A., and up to August 15, I had saved 5,800 feet, or over one mile of press

notices. Putting a low estimate upon this matter I consider that it is reasonably worth \$58,000. And while I am in the best position, perhaps, of any one in the National Association to receive these clippings, I am of the opinion that I have received not one-sixth of all notices. I think that I am making a fair estimate when I say this. Therefore, I believe that up to the present time the Northwest has received the benefits as a direct result of this meeting in Portland of advertising that is reasonably worth, if given out by an advertising agency fully \$348,000. And the end is not yet. Some of the papers have just commenced to tell of the trip of their representatives."

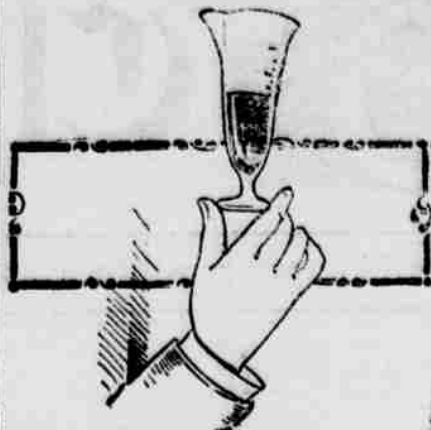

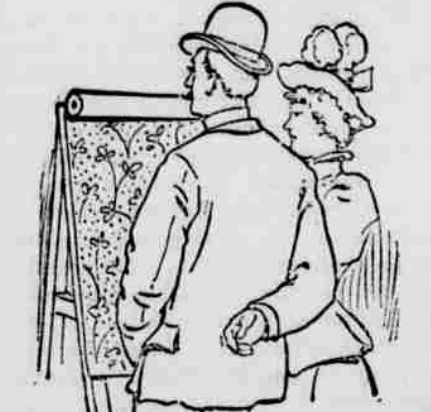

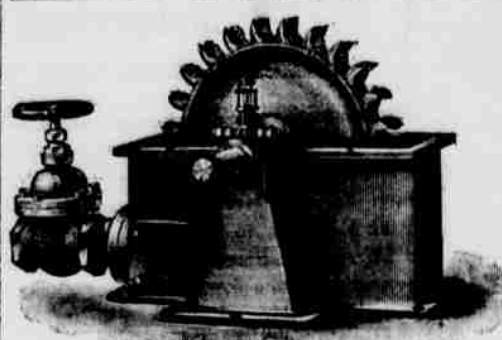
