## CAPTURED BY INSURGENTS

Report That the Gunboat *Urdaneta* Was Taken.

## WAS IN THE ORANI RIVER

One Officer and Nine of the Vessel's Crew Are Missing—Officer Was An Oregon Boy—Was Naval Cadet Welborn C. Wood, Appointed to the Naval Academy From This State

MANILA, Sept. 25.—It is reported that the insurgents have captured the United States gunboat *Urdaneta*, in the Orani river, on the northwest side of Manila bay, where she was patrolling. One officer and nine of her crew are missing. The gunboat *Petrel*, sent to investigate, returned and reported that the *Urdaneta* was beached opposite the town of Orani, on the Orani river she was burned and the following guns with their ammunition were captured:

One one-pounder, one Colt automatic gun and one Nordenfeldt, twenty-five millimeter gun. The crew of the *Urdaneta* are prisoners, or have been killed. Further details are lacking.

### Was Oregon Boy.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 25.—The gunboat *Urdaneta*, which was captured with her crew, about twenty-five miles from Manila, is a little craft of only forty tons displacement, not much larger than a small tug. She was captured by the navy early in the war, and has been on police duty in the bay for several months past. The records of the navy department show that she was one of the boats of which the Oregon is the parent ship. That is, she was supposed to draw all of her supplies from the battle-ship, to be manned from the Oregon's crew, and to act under instructions of the Oregon's commander.

According to last reports to the department, the little boat was last May under command of Naval Cadet Welborn C. Wood, but the personnel of the crew is not a matter of record, being subject to frequent change. Wood was appointed to the naval academy from Oregon, had passed his academic course, and was performing sea service at the time of the capture.

Naturally the department officials are vexed that difficulties of the negotiations looking to release of Lieutenant Gilmore, of the Yorktown, and his men should be added to by this last misfortune. Still there is no disposition unnecessarily to curb junior officers of the navy who are rendering such gallant service in the Philippines.

### Reception for State University.

EUGENE, Sept. 24.—The social part of the new school year opened last evening with a reception given by Regent and Mrs. S. H. Friendly to President and Mrs. Strong, the members of the faculty and students of the state university. Their home was tastefully decorated with palms and potted plants, and students, professors and their close friends spent a few very pleasant hours in a social way tending to more intimate acquaintance. Light refreshments were served. The school year has opened very promisingly in all respects, and there is a large attendance of new students. The past week has been devoted to assigning students and organizing classes, and everything is now arranged for regular recitations.

### Woman's Work in England.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—James O'Connell, president of the International Machinists, who had been a delegate to the British trades congress meeting held in Plymouth, England, spoke to the Central Federated Union of his exper-

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iences and observations at the congress and among the working classes in England. He did not have a high opinion of them. The condition of the English working men, women and children he said was deplorable. The difference of sex seemed to be entirely lost sight of. He saw the women going about in clogs, dressed in men's clothes, in blacksmith and other shops wielding the sledge hammers with the men.

### Was Instantly Killed.

GERVAIS, Or., Sept. 24.—James Kane, a character in this section, was thrown from a wagon last night in a runaway accident, and instantly killed. The accident occurred near St. Louis, three miles west of Gervais. Death was in-

stantaneous, as he fell on his head and the neck was dislocated.

He served in the United States army through the Nez Perces and Modoc Indian wars, having enlisted under the name of Fitzpatrick. He was a native of Connecticut, and more than 60 years of age. He was at one time the grand chief templar of the Independent Order of Good Templars of Oregon, but liquor caused his death. Friends here will bury him, as he was without funds or relatives.

## WILL START TOMORROW

Army Transports Nearly Ready to Come to Portland.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 24.—Captain Barneson, who is in charge of the fitting out of government transports here, stated tonight in an interview that two transports, the Sikh and City of Rio Janeiro, will likely leave next Tuesday for Portland to carry the Thirty-fifth regiment to Manila.

"We are now furnishing these vessels with supplies," said Captain Barneson, "and from present calculations they will leave here on the 26th."

"It will take them something like three days to get up the coast and Columbia river to Portland. Both transports are now in excellent condition for the trip, as much work has been done on them."

"The Rio Janeiro has capacity of 2800 tons, and will easily accommodate 750 men. The Sikh has room for 750 passengers."

## RHODES' DECISION WAITED FOR

Secret Deliberations Are Expected to End by Tomorrow.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—Another week has opened with the Transvaal situation making time. No news has yet been received of the delivery at Pretoria of the last British dispatch. The next big news will be the decision arrived at by the raid of the Orange Free state, whose secret deliberation is expected to close tomorrow, and it will come as a great surprise if the raid does not decide to link arms with the Transvaal. Neither the jingoes nor anti-war party are very proud of yesterday's affair on Trafalgar square, which proved nothing except that a mob is always "jingoo."

A telegram received from Calcutta announces the departure of the transport *Chidhana* for South Africa, and the last transport for the Cape will leave India tomorrow.

### Case of E. L. Mims.

PENDLETON, Or., Sept. 25.—Judge W. J. McSween, of Newport, Tenn., is here and will serve as associate counsel for defense in the case against Edwin L. Mims at the October term of the circuit court. Judge McSween is an attorney of considerable prominence in Tennessee. Judge Lowell will probably call a grand jury to consider the case.

Mims was accused of the murder of J. Henry Miller, the coroner's jury returning a verdict to that effect. Since the legislature passed the new law making it optional with circuit court judges to summon the grand jury or leave it for the district attorney to bring information against persons charged with crime, it has been the practice in the court here to follow the latter alternative. There has been no grand jury in session here since the law was enacted.

The reason for the judge taking this action in the Mims case is that the question has been raised in another county in the state as to the legality of the law which does partly away with the grand jury, and there was no desire in a capital case to leave anything open to doubt.
