A YEAR THAT BREAKS RECORDS

This is a record-breaking year for the United States. The production of nearly all the principal corn-growing states is so far ahead of all previous years that the falling off in some of the minor states will be more than compensated for, and the largest aggregate yield in the country's history is now assured, says the Globe-Democrat. Some of the authorities place the crop as high as 2,500,000,000 bushels, which would be far ahead of all the best years of the past, the highest previous yield being that of 1896, which was put by the government's department of agriculture, after all the returns were in, at 2,283,875,165 bushels. The wheat crop is believed to have exceeded all former yields except that of 1898.

In nearly every important field of industry the production is ahead of any year in the past. The production of pig iron has been steadily breaking records for several months, notwithstanding the large increase in price. The output of the woolen and cotton factories is apparently in the lead of all former figures. Railroad earnings are reflecting these advances by passing up to higher figures than were ever before reached. Bank clearances, which have all along been recognized as a trustworthy barometer of business conditions, have passed far beyond all previous totals. This is not only true of the clearances in New York and Chicago, where they could be affected by the operations of the speculative exchanges, but it is true of the other business centers of the country, large and small.

The government is feeling the tonic effect of these exhilarating conditions. Its gold reserve has passed far up beyond the highest line ever previously touched. Moreover, the tendency in this direction is likely to continue for a time, for gold is coming into the country from Australia, and more of it is likely to soon start from Europe to us. The treasury returns for August, notwithstanding the heavy expenditures due to the increased army burden, show a surplus of over \$4,000,000. August, it is true, is ordinarily a month of comparatively light disbursements. The indications are, however, that the tax laws will, under the spur of the immense business expansion, provide very nearly enough of revenue to meet all the government's expenditures hereafter, and may furnish quite enough. In an industrial, financial and political way, these are among the greatest days which the United States has seen.

In 1877 the Transvaal was practically bankrupt. Gold mining soon after became a paying industry, and

in 1889 the direct receipts of the treasury from gold mines were \$8,996,070. Members of the Volksraad now receive a salary of \$6000, or 20 per cent more than the pay of an American congressman.

In the twenty-one planks of the Democratic platform in Ohio not one refers to state issues, and yet McLean insists that the contest involves no national questions. The sixth plank runs thus: "We are opposed to entangling alliances with foreign kingdoms and empires." Secretary Hay knocked it out in short order.

HE HOPES TO SECURE VINDICATION

Eagan Decided to Appeal His Case to Congress for Consideration at the Coming Session of That Body.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Brigadier-General Charles P. Eagan, who was suspended from rank and duty as a result of the language employed by him before the war investigating commission, hopes to obtain vindication from congress during the coming session.

General Eagan is at Washington to settle matters connected with the furniture of the house he occupied before his departure for Hawaii. It is understood, however, that he is trying to enlist the sympathies of members of congress in order to obtain a congressional investigation of the beef scandal.

There is no intention on the part of the administration to restore General Eagan to duty. It is desired that he should apply for retirement in order that the president may appoint Colonel Weston, now acting commissary-general, a brigadier and commissary-general of subsistence. The president is anxious to do all he can for the colonel. During General Eagan's stay here a determined effort will be made to induce him to apply for retirement, but many think he will not do so, in view of the fact that he is now drawing full pay, and would only receive three-quarters on the retired list.

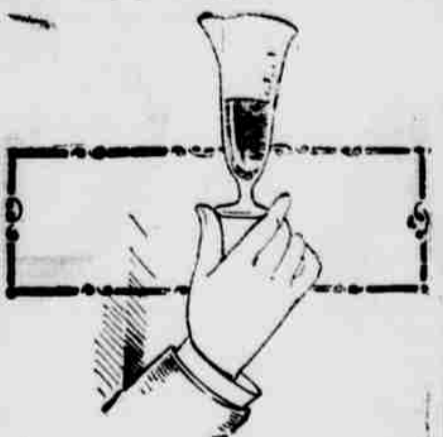

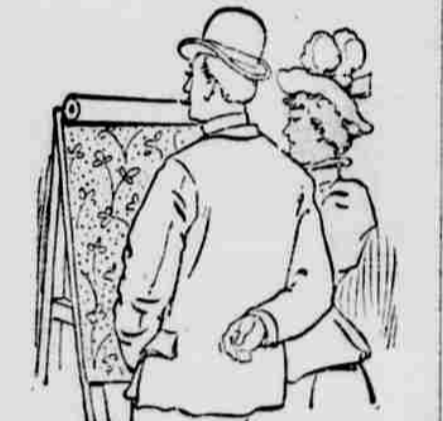
