## HOUSE OF THE VANDERBILTS

Is Rent in Twain Over Division of Property.

## ONE SON HAS WITHDRAWN

There Will Be No Contest—But One Was Narrowly Averted—Cornelius Vanderbilt, Jr., Is Represented to Be the Disturbing Element.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—The Tribune this morning says: The provisions of the will of Cornelius Vanderbilt, which were made public yesterday, excited intense interest. From certain remarks it appears that this settlement alone, effected after long discussion, prevented a contest that might have resulted in one of the greatest and most costly will litigations ever known.

Cornelius Vanderbilt, jr., when he learned the provisions of his father's will, placed his interests in the hands of his counsel, Carter & Ledyard. They conducted negotiations with Henry B. Anderson, the attorney of Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt. While none of those interested would say what was done, enough has been admitted to indicate that had Alfred not made the concession mentioned, litigation would have followed.

It was learned from a trustworthy source yesterday that Cornelius Vanderbilt, jr., is much disappointed by his father's will and the attitude in which he has been placed by his brother's handsome concession, and that he will withdraw from any further participation in the affairs of the Vanderbilt property. Cornelius Vanderbilt, jr., is described by those who know him intimately as a reticent young man. He took his disagreement with his father much to heart, and after his marriage tried in every way to overcome the difficulty.

He entered the office of the superintendent of motive power of the New York Central, and went to work to prove his merit. He worked early and late. He never asked more than any other employe. He did everything he could to prove to his father his serious intentions. He never complained, and never allowed an opportunity to pass without trying to secure a re-establishment of the former cordial relations between himself and his father.

It is said further that he hoped and believed he had succeeded in gaining his father's favor. The two men did not discuss the subject, but for hours father and son talked cordially at the Breakers in Newport, and also in this city.

### Inventor of the Linotype Dead.

BALTIMORE, Oct. 28.—Ottmar Mergenthaler, inventor of the linotype typesetting machine, died this morning of consumption.

Mergenthaler was born in Wurtemberg, Germany, in 1854. While he was still a boy he was apprenticed to a watchmaker, but did not serve out his time, owing to his desire to escape military service in the German army. When he landed in Baltimore his entire capital was only \$30. Going to Washington, the young immigrant secured work in the machine shop of his uncle, and it was there that he originated and perfected the printing business. The invention was somewhat slow in being generally adopted, but Mergenthaler lived to see the product of his genius in universal use. A syndicate, headed by Whitelaw Reid, exploited the patents. Mergenthaler was never strong in health.

### Intermediate Rates Cut.

ASTORIA, Oct. 27.—The only new feature in the passenger rate war now in progress between Astoria and Portland made its appearance in Clatskanie last evening. The boats of the Shaver Transportation Company, running be-

tween Clatskanie and Portland, reduced the fare to 50 cents each way. The railroad company has been charging \$1.40 for a single fare, and \$2 for the round trip. The Clatskanie people have been sending to Astoria for 25-cent tickets, and when the Shaver company learned of this they reduced their fare.

### Largest Ships in the World.

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 28.—A Duluth special to the Journal says that J. J. Hill has contracted in England for the construction of two immense steamships for trans-Pacific trade between Seattle and Japan. It is stated a Clyde firm has the contract, and that the ships will be monsters, 46 feet longer than the new Oceanic of the Atlantic. Each will be 750 feet, and 20,000 tons burden.

They cannot be in service until late in 1900, and if the Pacific trade continues to expand, they will not be out of place there. Reports also state that the two are but the first of a large fleet.
