Circular Letter from B. S. Pague.

The following self-explanatory circular servers and crop correspondents in Ore- feits. gon, and also the river observers, wheat reporters and display men in Oregon, Washington and Idaho:

PORTLAND, Nov. 29, 1899,

Under date of November 10, 1899, Prof. Willis L. Moore, Chief of U. S. Weather Bureau, Washington, D. C. writes me as follows:

"It is the desire and intention of the central office that all of the forecast officials of the weather bureau shall have practical experience in forecasting for all the districts in the United States. For several years you have had experience in issning predictions for the Pacitic coast states, and it is thought that you should become familiar with the practical work of forcasting in the eastwest. You will soon receive orders for temporary assignment at Chicago. This assignment will concinue from three to six months. It is expected that you will arrive at Chicago by January 1st.

The orders mentioged have been received. I shall leave this city about the middle of December; during my absence Mr. Geo. N. Salisbury, section director, weather bureau, now in charge at Seattle, will be the official in charge here.

The work of this office will proceed uninterruptedly. The forecasts weather, temperature, rain, snow, frosts, river and storm warnings will be prepared and issued by Mr. Salisonry and he will do all other work heretofore done by me, until my return.

For eleven years I have been in charge of this office; have always had the cordial support of all persons co-operating with this bureau and I request that the same generous courtesy be given my successor.

The office has grown, during the time that I have been here, from a small to a large one. Formerly two persons did

all the work, now there are seven. Forecasts are issued only from the offices in Washington City, Chicago, San Francisco and Portland, hence the importance of this office and the responsible position of the official in charge are apparent. The rank or grade of this office and the success of its work is largely due to you who have so generously and will incly aided me. I am deeply grateful for your co operation and trust that by July 1st, 1900, I shall be in your midst again, and that success will crown your labore and those of this bureau as well.



Section to of Article XI. shall be as follows:

Section 10. No county, city, town, school district or other municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner or for any purpose to an amount including present existing indebtedness in the aggregate exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and county taxes previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

The Legislative Assembly may create as many circuits as may be necessary.
