In accordance with the provisions of an Act entitled "An Act Submitting to the Electors of the State of Oregon at the coneral Election to be held on the first Monday in June, 1900, the pending Proposed Constitutional Amendments," approved February 1s, 1829, 1, T. T. Geer, Governor of the State of Oregon, do horeby eatise the following proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Oregon, as certified to by the Secretary of State, to be published for five consecutive weeks in The Dathes Chrostick, a newspaper published in the Seventh Judicial District of the State of Oregon.

Done at the Capitol, at Salem, Oregon, [SEAL] this 21-t day of November, A. D. 1899.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 4.

Re it resolved by the Senate, the House con-curring. That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and is hereby proposed. That Section is of Article XI, of the Constitution of the state of Ovegon be and the same is hereby abrogated, and in iten thereof section 10 of Article XI, shall be as follows: ARTICLE XL.

Section 10. No county, city, town, school district or other municipal cornoration shall be allowed to become indebted in any manuer or for any purpose to an amount including present existing indebtedness in the aggregate exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and county taxes previous to the incurring of such indeptedness.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House con-curring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon, in lice of Section Ten of Article Seven (7), be and the same

is hereby proposed, to-wit: SECTION TEN. The Legislative Assembly may provide for the election of Supreme and threait Juriges in distinct classes, one of which classes shall consist of five Justices of the supreme (court, who shall not perform circuit duty and the other class shall consist of as many tirruit Judges as may be deemed necess ry, who shall hold full terms without allotment and who shall take the same

oath as the supreme Judges.

The Legislative Assembly may create as many circuits as may be necessary. Adopted by the Senate, February 15, 1893, C. W. FULTON, President of the Senate.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 10. Resolved by the House, the Senate concurr-ing: That the following amendment to the Con-stitution of the State of Oregon be and hereby is proposed: That the Constitution be amended by adding

ARTICLE XIX.

Section 1. The necessary use of lands for the construction of reservoirs or storage basins for the partiese of irrigation or for rights of way for the construction of canals, ditches flumes or pipes to convey water to the place of use for any useful, beneficial or necessary purpose or for grainage, or for drainage of mines or the workings thereof, by means of roads, railroads, transways, cuts, tunnels, shafts, hoisting works, dump or other necessary means to their complete development or any other use necessary to the complete development of the natural resources of the state or preservation of the health of vis inhabitants, is hereby declared to be a public use and subject to the regulation and control of the State.
