The management of the Boys' and Girls'Aid S ciety of Oregon feel extremely grateful to the pupile of the public actionis of your city for their generous donation on Thankegiving, which was the best donation received outside of Portnate than themselves in having a good home and fair treatment with their parents.

It might be interesting to many to know how much in the aggregate a donation from the children of the public schools will amount too, and they can readily see how much such a donation can help an institution such as the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, in caring for its many charges through the winter months. It must be remembered that in many instances a child will bring a can of jelly, a can of fruit, a small package of groceries, an apple or rotato or some cabbage, but when this is placed together it amounts to a present well institution, and in the case of the school children of your city it amounted to as follows: 16 two-quart jare, 27 one-quart jars, 15 pint jars, 11 glasses of jelly, 20 chicken feed. tin cans of goods, 4 bottles of cateup, 6 packages of mush and raisins, miscellaneous packages dried fruit, rice, nuts, sittings. So says Gifford. toys, beans, 2 sacks potatoes, 1 cake, 1 lox apples, I box crackers and clothing; also \$33 25 in cash, after deducting 90 cents for drayage.
