

Geer, Governor of the State of Oregon, do hereby cause the following proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Oregon, as certified to by the secretary of Stat., to be published for five consecutive weeks in The Dalles Chronick, a newspaper published in the seventh Judicial District of the State of Oregon.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 4.

By the Governor: F. I. DUNBAR, Secretary of State.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House concurring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and is hereby proposed:

That Section 10 of Article X1, of the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and the same is hereby shregated, and in lien thereof Section 10 of Article X1, shall be as follows:

ARTICLE XL.

Section 10. No county, city, town, school district or other municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner or for any purpose to an amount including present existing indebtedness in the aggregate exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and county taxes previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 13. Be it resolved by the Senate, the House con-curring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon, in lieu of Section Ten of Article Seven (7), be and the same is hereby proposed, to wit:

SECTION TEN. The Legislative Assembly may provide for the election of supreme and circuit Judges in distinct classes, one of which classes shall consist of five Justices of the supreme court, who shall not perform circuit duty, and the other class shall consist of as many thread Judges as may be deemed necess ry, who shall hold full terms without allotment and who shall take the same each as the supreme land who shall take the same

oath as the Supreme Judges.


