In accordance with the provisions of an Act
entitled "An Act submitting to the Electors of
the State of Oregon at the General Election to be
held on the 1st day of November, 1890, a proposed
amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon," do hereby cause the
following proposed amendment to the Constitu-
tion of the State of Oregon to be certified to the
Secretary of State, to be published for the
consideration of the people of the District of the
State of Oregon.

Done at the Capitol, at Salem, Oregon,

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 4.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House con-
curring: That the following amendment to the
Constitution of the State of Oregon be and is hereby
proposed:

That section 10 of Article XI. of the Constitu-
tion of the state of Oregon be and the same is
hereby abrogated, and by this method Section 10
of Article XI. shall be as follows:

ARTICLE XI.

Section 10. No corporation, city, town, school dis-
trict or other municipal corporation shall be al-
lowed to become indebted to any member or for
any purpose to an amount exceeding present ex-
isting indebtedness in the aggregate exceeding
five per centum on the value of the taxable
property therein to be assessed by the last as-
sessments, so that no property taxes previous to
the incurrence of such indebtedness.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 13.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House con-
curring: That the following amendment to the Constitu-
tion of the State of Oregon be and the same is
hereby proposed: To wit:

ARTICLE XII.

The Legislative Assembly may provide for the
election of members of the legislative assembly in
distinct classes, one of which classes shall consist
of five Justices of the Supreme Court, who shall
not perform circuit duty, and the other class
shall consist of as many Circuit Judges as may
be deemed necessary, who shall hold full terms
without circuit and go shall take the same
as the Supreme Court.

The legislative assembly may create as many
circuits as may be necessary.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 14.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House con-
curring: That the following amendment to the Constitu-
tion of the state of Oregon be and is hereby
proposed:

ARTICLE XIII.

Section 1. The necessary use of lands for the
construction of reservoirs or storage basins for
the purpose of irrigation or for water power
or for any other purposes, or for the
conversion of rivers to a place of use for any
useful, beneficial or necessary purpose, or for
storage or for drainage of waters of the
watershed, by means of dykes, embankments,
canals, tunnels, dams, dredging works,
piping or other means, shall be allowed
or permitted by the legislature of the state
of Oregon, in the manner prescribed by law.

Section 2. The right to collect taxes of any
kind for the use of water supplied by any
city, town or water district or county
or otherwise, and to collect and to exercise
such right by authority of and in manner
prescribed by law.

Section 3. The right to appropriate the
waters of any stream or watercourse for
any use, except as provided in Article 14.

Section 4. The use of all waters now apportioned
or otherwise appropriated, except all
water used for irrigation, shall be
subject to the payment of a tax of not less
than one cent per thousand feet of
water so used.

Section 5. The use of all waters not
appropriated or otherwise appropriated
shall be subject to a tax of not less
than one cent per thousand feet of
water so used.

Section 6. The use of all waters not
appropriated or otherwise appropriated
