**Hold Ups.**

Hold-ups were the rule all around in the city Saturday and yesterday. The first victim was a stranger who claims to have been held up Saturday night in the East End, but the attempt was futile, as the fellow had nothing to be relieved of. This morning Chas. Wilson was arrested on suspicion, and is now lodged in the county jail.

The second hold-up took place early yesterday morning, when Frank Quinlan and John Carey, two tramps, held up two other "gentlemen of leisure"—Peter Kockler and Roy Williamson—who had taken up quarters in some box care in the yards above the Wasco warehouse. Frank Gable then went through their pockets, while a curious crowd gathered about. They were then taken to the jail.

**Notice to Voters.**

Under the provisions of the registration law all persons when registering are required to furnish to the registering officer the following information:

If naturalized, the time, place, and court of naturalization. In this connection, it is necessary to produce naturalization papers, or declaration of intention.

Residence must be specific; giving precinct, section, township and range; if within town or city, the street, No. if any, and No. of lot and block; if in any building where rooms are numbered, the number of the room and floor must be given.

In order to avoid unnecessary delay and inconvenience, every person desiring to register should be prepared to furnish the above information.

Facilities will be furnished in every precinct in the county by either Justice of the Peace or Notary Public.

O'NEIL, Governor of the State of Oregon, do hereby cause the following proposed amendments to the Constitution of the state of Oregon, as certified to by the secretary of state, to be published in full in this newspaper published in the Dalles District, a newspaper published in the seventh judicial district of the state of Oregon.

Done at the Capitol, at Salem, Oregon, this 21st day of November, A. D. 1905.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 4.**

Be it resolved by the senate, the House concurring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the state of Oregon be and is hereby proposed:

That section 10 of Article XI of the Constitution of the state of Oregon be and the same is hereby amended, and in lieu thereof section 10 of Article XI shall be as follows:

**ARTICLE XI.**

Section 10. No county, city, town, school district or other municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner or for any purpose to an amount exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for state and county taxes previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 13.**

Be it resolved by the senate, the House concurring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the state of Oregon, in lieu of section ten of Article seven (7), be and the same is hereby proposed, to-wit:

**SECTION TEN.**

The Legislative Assembly may provide for the election of Supreme and Appeal Judges of different classes, one of which classes shall consist of five Justices of the supreme court, who shall not perform circuit duty, and the other classes shall consist of as many circuit judges as may be deemed necessary, who shall hold full terms without allotment and who shall take the same oath as the supreme judges.

The Legislative Assembly may create as many circuits as may be necessary.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 19.**

Resolved by the House, the Senate concurring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the state of Oregon be and is hereby proposed:

That the Constitution be amended by adding Article XIX, as follows, to-wit:

**ARTICLE XIX.**

Section 1. The necessary use of lands for the construction of reservoirs or storage basins for the purpose of irrigation or for rights of way for the construction of canals, ditches, flumes or drains, cuts, canals, canals, holding works, dams or other necessary means to their complete development or any other use necessary to the complete development of the natural resources of the state or preservation of the health of its inhabitants, is hereby declared to be a public use and subject to the regulation and control of the state.

Section 2. The right to appropriate the unappropriated waters of any natural stream to beneficial uses shall never be denied.

Section 3. The use of all waters now appropriated for sale, rental or distribution, or hereafter, shall be subject to the regulation and control of the state in the manner prescribed by law, but the right to use and appropriate such waters shall be subject to the provisions of law for the granting of private water rights for private use as provided in section 15, Article 15 of the Constitution of the state of Oregon.

Section 4. The use of water for power or compensation for the use of water supplied to any county, city, town or water district or inhabitants thereof, is a franchise, and cannot be exercised except by authority of and in a manner prescribed by law.

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the state of Oregon, by repealing section 35 of Article 1.

Resolved by the House, the Senate concurring: That section 35 of Article 1 of the Constitution be and is hereby repealed.

**ARTICLE I.**

The elective franchise in this State shall not hereafter be prohibited to any citizen on account of sex.

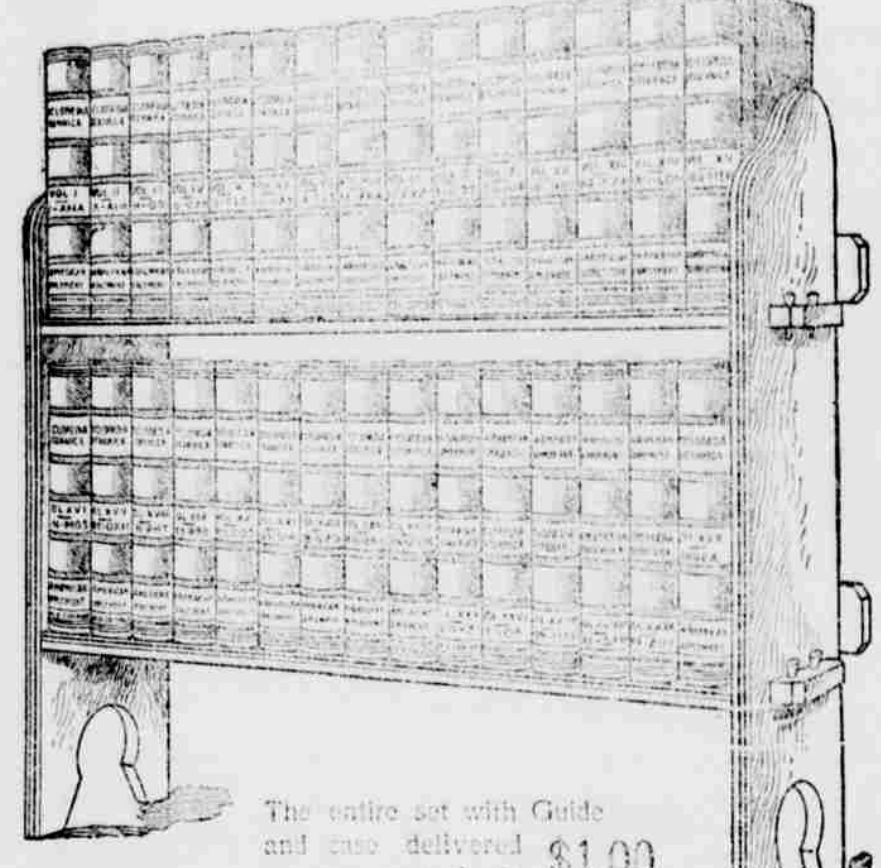
