A Sheep King's Views.
Mr. William Penland, Morrow county's sheep king, was a business caller to this office yesterday. When asked his opinion as to the propriety of contracting wool at this stage of the game, Mr. Penland said he was emphatically opposed to such action. It is within the power of the sheepmen themselves, he said, to regulate to a great extent the price of wool. If the buyers can succeed in contracting a lot of wool at 15 1/2 cents now, they will be able to supply the demand for a time, and will therefore have the remainder of the wool growers at their mercy. If all the sheepmen retain their wool until the proper time comes to sell it, it will force the buyers to pay market prices, which, from all indications, promise to be very satisfactory, else the wool buyers would not be so anxious just now to contract all they can at 15 1/2 cents per pound. Several other prominent wool growers of this county coincide with Mr. Penland's views, while a few int'mate that 15 1/2 is good enough for them. It is a hard matter to say just now which would be the better plan, but a few months will decide the matter.

Notice to Voters.
Under the provisions of the registration law all persons when registering are required to furnish to the registering officer the following information:
If naturalized, the time, place, and court of naturalization. In this connection, it is necessary to produce naturalization papers, or declaration of intention.
Residence must be specific; giving precinct, section, township and range; if within town or city, the street, No. if any, and No. of lot and block; if in any building where rooms are numbered, the number of the room and floor must be given.
In order to avoid unnecessary delay and inconvenience, every person desiring to register should be prepared to furnish the above information.
Facilities will be furnished in every precinct in the county by either Justice of the Peace or Notary Public.

In accordance with the provisions of an Act entitled "An Act Submitting to the Electors of the State of Oregon the General Election to be held on the 4th day of November, 1893, the proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Oregon, approved February 18, 1892, by the Governor of the State of Oregon, and which cause the Secretary of State, to be published for five consecutive weeks in the Official Register of the State of Oregon, in the seventh Judicial District of the State of Oregon.
Done at the Capitol, at Salem, Oregon, this 21st day of November, A. D. 1893.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 4.
Be it resolved by the Senate, the House concurring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and is hereby proposed:
That section 10 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and the same is hereby amended, and in lieu thereof section 10 of Article XI, shall be as follows:
ARTICLE XI.
Section 10. No county, city, town, school district or other municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner or for any purpose to an amount including present existing indebtedness, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for state and county taxes previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 13.
Be it resolved by the Senate, the House concurring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon, in lieu of section Ten of Article Seven (7), be and the same is hereby proposed, to-wit:
SECTION TEN.
The Legislative Assembly may provide for the election of supreme and circuit Judges in distinct classes, one of which classes shall consist of five Justices of the supreme court, who shall not perform circuit duty, and the other class shall consist of as many circuit Judges as may be deemed necessary, who shall hold full terms without allowance and who shall take the same oath as the supreme Judges.
The Legislative Assembly may create as many circuits as may be necessary.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 10.
Resolved by the House, the Senate concurring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and hereby is proposed:
That the Constitution be amended by adding Article XIX, as follows, to-wit:
ARTICLE XIX.
Section 1. The necessary use of lands for the construction of reservoirs or storage basins for the purpose of irrigation or for rights of way for the construction of canals, ditches, flumes or lines to convey water to the place of use for any other beneficial purpose, or for storage, or for drainage of mines or the work ings thereof, by means of roads, railroads, tramways, cuts, tunnels, shafts, hoisting works, and subject to the regulation and control of the complete development of the natural resources of the State or preservation of the health of its inhabitants, is hereby declared to be a public use and subject to the regulation and control of the State.
Section 2. The right to appropriate the unappropriated waters of any natural stream to beneficial uses shall never be denied.
Section 3. The use of all waters now appropriated for sale, rental or distribution, also of all waters originally appropriated for private use, but which, after such appropriation, has heretofore been or may hereafter be sold, rented or distributed, is hereby declared to be a public use and subject to the regulation and control of the State in the manner prescribed by law. But the right to use and appropriate such waters shall be subject to such provisions of law for the taking of private property for public use as are provided in section 19, Article I of the Constitution of the State of Oregon.
Section 4. The right to collect taxes or compensation for the regulation and control of the county, city, town or water district or inhabitants thereof, is a franchise, and cannot be exercised except by authority of and in a manner prescribed by law.

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon, by repealing section 35 of Article I.
Resolved by the House, the Senate concurring: That section 35 of Article I of the Constitution be and hereby is repealed.

ARTICLE I.
The elective franchise in this State shall not hereafter be prohibited to any citizen on account of sex.

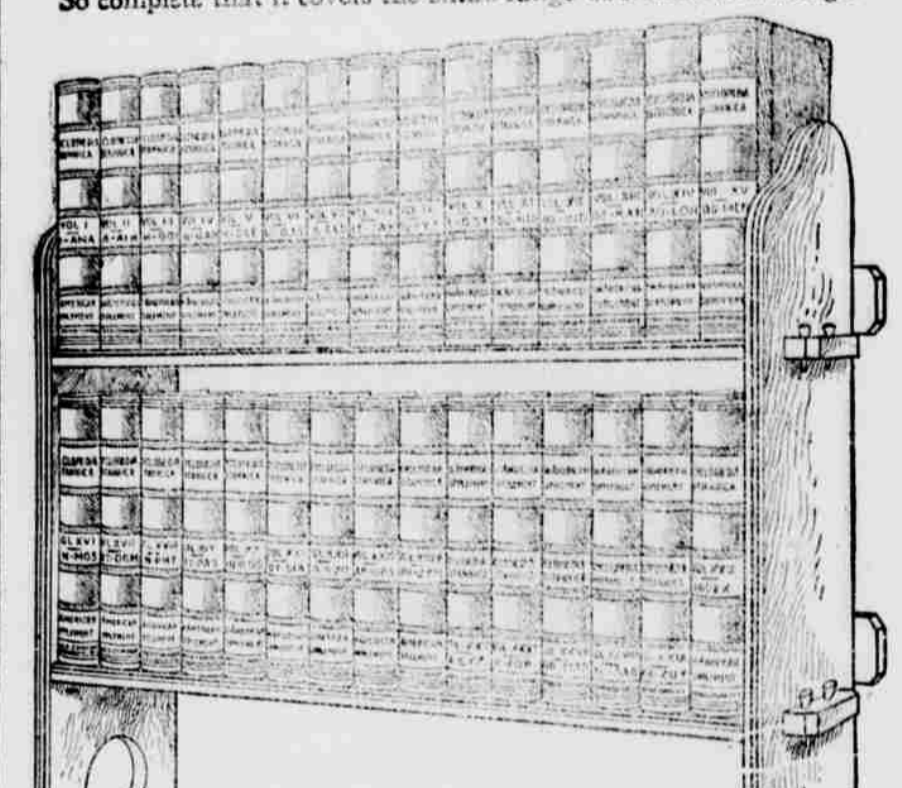
