Notice to Voters.

Under the provisions of the registraion law all persons when registering are required to furnish to the registering officer the following information:

If naturalized, the time, place, and court of naturalization. In this connection, it is necessary to produce naturalization papers, or declaration of intention.

Residence must be specific; giving precinct, section, township and range; if within town or city, the street, No. if any, and No. of lot and block; if in any building where rooms are numbered, the number of the room and floor must be given.

In order to avoid unnecessary delay and inconvenience, every person desiring to register should be prepared to furnish the above information.

Facilities will be furnished in every precinct in the county by either Justice of the Peace or Notary Public.

In accordance with the provisions of an Act entitled "An Act Submitting to the Electors of the State of Oregon at the General Election to be held on the first Monday in June, 1900, the pending Proposed Constitutional Amendments." pending Proposed Constitutional Amendments, approved February 1s, 1892, I, T. T. Geer, Governor of the State of Oregon, do hereby cause the following proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Oregon, as certified to by the Secretary of State, to be published for five consecutive weeks in The Dallies Crassicies, a newspaper published in the Seventh Judicial District of the State of Oregon.

Done at the Capitol, at Salem, Oregon, [SEAL] this 21st day of November, A. D. 1899

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 4. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 1.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House concurring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and is hereby proposed.

That section is of Article XL of the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and the same is hereby abrogated, and in lies thereof Section 10 of Article XL shall be as follows:

ARTICLE XI.

Section 1e. No county, city, town, school district or other municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner or for any purpose to an amount including present existing indebtedness in the aggregate exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and county taxes previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 13. Be it resolved by the senate, the House con-curring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon, in lieu of section Ten of Article Seven (7), be and the same is hereby proposed, to wit: SECTION TEN.

The Legislative Assembly may provide for the election of Supreme and Circuit Judges in distinct classes, one of which classes shall consist of five Justices of the supreme court, who shall not perform circuit duty; and the other class shall consist of as many Circuit Judges as may be decined necessity, who shall hold full terms without allottaeat and who shall take the same oath as the Supreme Judges.

The Lagislative Assembly may create as many circuits as may be necessary.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 10. Resolved by the House, the Senate concurr-ing: That the following amendment to the Con-stitution of the State of Oregon be and hereby to normals: proposed: That the Constitution be amended by adding Article XIX, as follows, to-wit:

ARTICLE XIX.

Section 1. The necessary use of lands for the construction of reservoirs or storage basins for the purpose of irrigation or for rights of way for the construction of canals, dicher, flumes or pipes to convey water to the place of use for any useful, beneficial or necessary purpose, or for oratinage, or for drainage of mines or the work luzs thereof, by means of roads, railroads, tramways, cuts, tunnels, rhafts, hoisting works, dum, or other necessary means to their complete development or any other use necessary to the complete development of the natural resources of the state or preservation of the health of its linkabitants, is hereby declared to be a public use and subject to the regulation and control of the State. ARTICLE XIX.

pensation i. The right to esticat taxes or com-pensation for the use of water supplied to any county, city, town or water district or inhabit-ants thereof, is a franchise, and cannot be exer-cised except by authority of and in a manner prescribed by law.


