In accordance with the provisions of an Act entitled "An Act submitting to the Electors of the State of Oregon at the General Election to be held on the first Mondey in June, 1900, the pending Proposed Constitutional Amendments, approved Pebruary 18, 1998, 1, T. T. Geer, Governar of the State of Oregon, do hereby cause the following proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Oregon, as certified to by the Secretary of State, to be published for five consecutive weeks in The Dalles Clisoxicle, a newspaper published in the Seventh Judicial District of the State of Oregon.

Done at the Capitol, at Salem, Oregon.

SENATE JOINT BESOLUTION, NO. 3. Be it resolved by the Schate, the House con-curring: That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and is hereby proposed:

That section to of Article XI, of the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and the same is hereby abrogated, and in then thereof Section 10 of Article XI, shall be as follows:

ABTICLE XI.

Section 10. No county, city, town, school district or other municipal cornoration shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner or for any purpose to an amount including present existing indebtedness in the aggregate exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and county taxes previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 10. Resolved by the House, the Senate concurr-ing: That the following amendment to the Con-stitution of the State of Oregon be and nereby is proposed:
That the Constitution be amended by adding Article XIX, as follows, to-wit: ARTICLE XIX.

section 1. The necessary use of lands for the construction of reservoirs or storage basins for the purpose of irrigation or for rights of way for the construction of canals, diches, finmes or plies to convey water to the place of use for any useful, beneficial or necessary purpose, or for drainage, or for drainage of mines or the work ings thereof, by means of roads, radiroads, transways, cuts, tunnels, shafts, hoisting wooks, dump or other necessary means to their complete development or any other use necessary to the complete development of the natural resources of the state or preservation of the health of its inhabitants, is hereby declared to be a public use and subject to the regulation and control of the state.


